Auto Company Sues.

Baker, June 30.—Cranston & Company, automobile dealers, yesterday filed suit against James York to recover the sum of \$165. The complaint alleges that the plaintiff company performed work for the defendant on his automobile, repairing the machine and furnishing parts for same. The account is long past due, according to the complaint, and the defendant has refused to make settlement, although asked to do so.

Chinese In Scrap.

Baker, June 30.—Two Chinese got into an argument last evening on Main street, which first resulted in the spilling of a lot of blood and later in the aggressor landing in the city "coop," with his fate to be decided by the Honorable Judge Cuning this morning. Officer Nelson came upon the scene just as one "Chink" was making his getaway with a trail of gore behind him. He rushed up to the officer and demanded the arrest of his assailant.

La Grande Man In Trouble.

Baker, June 30.—Frank George, a Greek 22 or 23 years of age, was arrested last evening by Officer Nelson. Complaint was made by a number of young girls that he followed them about the streets and tried to force his attentions on them. He claims La Grande as his home, but has been in Baker for a couple of weeks or more.

Report One Fatality.

Salem, Or., June 30.—Sixty-nine accidents, one of them fatal, were reported to the state labor commissioner by the various industrial institutions of the state during last week. The fatality occurred at Silver Creek Falls, where K. Liend, a logger, was killed. A third of the accidents occurred in connection with railroad work.

Reception at Normal.

Monmouth, Or., June 30.—The faculty of the Oregon Normal school gave a reception to the 420 students attending the summer session, in the gymnasium Saturday night. The gathering represented every section of Oregon and four other states. The gymnasium was elaborately decorated for the occasion.

Dallas, Or., June 30.—Sheriff John Grant of this city, has received information that L. G. Martin, the man he arrested at Salem a few weeks ago for endeavoring to pass a forged draft on the Dallas City bank for \$15,000, and whom he later turned over to the authorities of Ramsey county, Minnesota, where he was wanted on a similar charge, has received a sentence at St. Paul of from five to 10

NOTICE OF SEWER IMPROVEMENT.

To Whom It May Concern: You will hereby take notice that in pursuance with a resolution adopted by the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 27th day of May, 1914, creating Sewer District No. 2, Section 3, and designating and declaring the real property hereinafter described as included in and comprising said District, and in pursuance of a Resolution duly adopted by said Commission on the 27th day of May, 1914, whereby said City Commission determined the necessity of and declared its intention to improve said District and all the real property included therein as hereinafter described by laying therein a sewer and in pursuance of the Report of the Committee on Estimates, heretofore made in relation thereto, and adopted by said Commission, the City Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, will meet at the Commission Chamber of said City on the 8th day of July, 1914, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock, P. M. of said day, and consider the levy of a special assessment against all the real property benefitted or affected by said proposed improvement, and grant a hearing before said Commission to all persons feeling aggrieved on account of said proposed levy or said special assessment to pay the costs and expenses thereof.

That the boundaries of the district to be benefitted or affected by such proposed improvement are as follows to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the center line of North Depot St., which is north 100 feet from the north property line of "Y" Avenue, the boundary line runs thence south along the center line of north Depot Street to a point 135 feet south of the southwest property line of Jackson Avenue; thence northwesterly 100 feet from and parallel with the southwest property line of Jackson Avenue to the center line of north Fourth Street; thence north along the center line of North Fourth Street to a point 100 feet north of the north property line of "Y" Avenue; thence east 100 feet from and parallel with the north property line of "Y" Avenue to the place of beginning, all in the City of La Grande, Union County Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given you that the said City Commission proposes to levy a special assessment on all of the property affected or benefitted by such proposed improvement for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of the same. That the estimated cost of such proposed improvement is the sum of \$6023.98.

If you have any remonstrance to make against said proposed improvement or the proposed levy of such special assessment or feel aggrieved against the same before said Commission at the time and place above specified, or be forever thereafter barred and foreclosed from making the same.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED STREET IMPROVEMENT.

To Whom It May Concern, you are hereby notified that the Committee on Estimates appointed by the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, to make an examination of the property, upon which assessments are to be levied to pay the costs and expenses of the street improvement hereinafter described, as to the valuation and extent, if any of the benefits to be derived by said property by reason of said improvement, have made their report in writing to said commission, which report has been received by said Commission, and is on file in the offices of the Recorder of said City, and is open for your inspection. That it is the intention of said Commission to levy a special assessment against all the property hereinafter described for the purpose of paying the costs and expenses of improving Fourth Street, on both the east and west sides thereof, between the south curb line of Spring Avenue to the north curb line of J. Avenue, by constructing and placing thereon, on each side of said street where same are not now in place, five-foot standard concrete sidewalks with concrete aprons at all intersections, according to the plans and specifications therefore heretofore adopted by said Commission and on file in the office of the Recorder of said City.

That the real property included in and the boundaries of the district benefitted and affected by said improvement are as follows: Beginning at a point on the center line of Spring Avenue which is west 100 feet from the north property line of Fourth Street; the boundary line runs thence south 100 feet from parallel with the west property line of Fourth Street to the center line of J. Avenue, thence east along the center line of J. Avenue to a point 70 feet east of the west property line of Fourth Street, thence north 70 feet from and parallel with the east property line of Fourth Street to the center line of Spring Avenue; thence west along the center line of Spring to the place of beginning; all in the City of La Grande, Oregon, and the estimated cost of said improvement is \$1,714.79.

You will further take notice that said City Commission will meet at the Commission Chamber in the City Building of said City on the 8th day of July, 1914, at 7:30 o'clock P. M. of said day, to consider making said proposed levy and will then grant a hearing to any and all persons feel-

ing aggrieved against, or on account of, said proposed assessments.
