

# REVISION OF CHARTER ASKED

## COMMITTEE REPORTS AFTER LONG DELIBERATION.

### Suggested Changes be Put Into Brief Form and Filed Last Night.

All the details of the new commission form of government charter that need correcting, were set out to the city commission last evening by a citizens' committee which has been at work on the proposition for several months. The suggested changes will be put into tabulated form and published tomorrow or soon after. The committee was discharged after making its report and the petition asking for a charter revision election to remedy these minor details—minor in a way yet imperative to the perfection of the system—was also filed with the commission.

The session was an important one, being the first of the month meeting and bills and accounts were gone over.

The reports of former Chief of Police Avant were filed and found correct and the auditor's report checking out Treasurer Mansager was filed and found correct.

General manager's report for the week ending June 27th, follows:

I beg to report that the treasurer collected \$1444.55 street assessments and interest on same, \$340.30 water rent, \$945.00 licenses, including J. D. Kerr, and \$2.00 electrical permits.

The recorder turned over \$217.69 as June receipts. Also received \$24,182.77 for improvement bonds, number 663 to 711, with \$64.35 accrued interest. Paid \$24,996.91 for warrants and interest thereon. Paid \$285 interest on improvement bonds, paid \$625.00 semi-annual interest on court house bonds, and \$250.00 on additional sewer bonds.

The recorder received \$45.00 fines, \$1.00 pound fee, \$1.00 dog tag, \$1.00 for two building permits. Issued one electrical license on treasurer's receipt for \$20.00. Issued \$875.00 warrant on special interest and \$7.50 on park fund. A. Ford labor certificate warrant \$4.67, as special police, I. W. Faulk \$4.65 same, Ed Wright court reporter half of fee Coleman vs. City \$12.50, Lee Warnick freight, express, etc., \$67.02, during June. Drew warrant on improvement district No. 82, \$2428.53, the final 10 per cent on Spring Avenue, and \$285.00 interest on improvement district interest.

The street superintendent spent \$60.50 on repairs and construction and \$82.50 cleaning streets. Also \$4.93

for material for cleaning and \$73.57 for lumber, etc., mostly cross walks. Got \$23.00 worth of work out of the prisoners.

Water superintendent spent \$23.00 reading meters, \$5.75 on Y. M. C. A. tap and \$5.75 time on Coleman case.

The police raised one quarantine. Arrested 19, paroled 3, five served time, five in jail, \$45.00 fines, \$1.00 pound fees, used extra police during merchants' convention, Chief Orsi, Ed Brady, Art Weagle, H. E. Bryant on force. Thos. De Borde pound master. The chief recommends the strict enforcement of ordinance against fire crackers. Several merchants are placing fire crackers on sale, contrary to ordinance. This city has had a safe and sane regulation for over 20 years and there is no need for relaxing now when others are starting to regulate and exclude fireworks.

No fires during the week, the chief is absent on leave, with Mr. James O'Neal on duty.

### Fire Takes All; Makes Sept. Morn.

Boise, July 2.—Two hungry men—no dinner, no clothes, no home. This is the situation which obtained in tent town Friday evening about 6 o'clock.

Two young men who have been batching together, living in a tent close to the river near the lower bridge, had prepared a savory mulligan stew, put it to boil over a small oil stove in their tent, and concluded to cool off with a refreshing bath while the stew was cooking.

A hungry canine became cognizant of the stew while the bathers were in the river, and in his efforts to ascertain if it were seasoned to his liking, knocked over the stove. In a moment dinner, tent, clothing and all the worldly possessions of the two men had gone up in smoke, and they were obliged to call for help from the shore to secure clothing with which to cover themselves on coming from the water to survey the remains of their abode.

Lee Spangler was acquainted with the men and he interested himself in securing some clothing and supplies for them.

### Marshfield Building Denied.

Marshfield, June 30.—Coos county will not be allowed to have a special building at the San Francisco exposition as was planned in spite of the efforts of Mayor Simpson of North Bend and the work of Harris D. H. Connick, director of works of the exposition, who, as a friend of Mr. Simpson, endeavored in behalf of Coos county to induce the fair officials to permit the building.

The decision of the fair management is a great disappointment to Mayor Simpson as he has for some time past worked hard in his efforts to carry out their plan.

### Johns Captures Tennis Cup.

Pendleton, July 2.—James S. Johns erstwhile star track athlete of the University of Oregon, yesterday won new athletic laurels when he captured the city championship in the first tennis tournament ever held here. He won the finals during the afternoon from Frank R. Atkins by taking three straight sets, 9-7, 6-1 and 6-3.

The tournament began last Friday, and by the process of elimination the contest was narrowed down to Johns and Atkins. Previous to their match, Johns had defeated in turn R. E. Chloupek, W. C. McKinney and C. E. Nelson, while Atkins had won from C. O. Rhinehart, Folland Oliver and James Bowler. There was a great deal of interest in the final match and the odds were in favor of Johns. Johns' style of playing proved too much for him, however. Atkins is a quick, nervous player, inclined to press the play as hard as possible. Johns is deliberate, taking plenty of time in serving and between serves and his refusal to hurry soon told upon the other. The first set was a hard fought one, but when Johns finally won the marginal two games, the other two sets were easy for him.

### Lodell to Protest Game.

Pendleton, July 2.—On the grounds that Walla Walla had more men in uniform yesterday than the by-laws of the league allow, Manager Al Lodell of the Pendleton team has announced that he will protest the game of yesterday, won by Walla Walla, 1 to 0. He claims Walla Walla had fifteen players in uniform where as the bylaws permit only fourteen men to be carried and then only providing the salary limit is not exceeded. With the acquisition of Patterson, Walla Walla has five men on her pitching staff. Rees was slated for the blue slip but his release had not yet been turned in and that player was not only in suit but was sent to the warming-up slab, according to reports. Cotton Harmon was also in the line-up yesterday and according to a Walla Walla paper, efforts are being made to get Tiny Leonard, the high priced Bear pitcher of other years, back into the fold. The president of the league has 15 days in which to decide a protest.

To Whom It May Concern: You will hereby take notice that in pursuance with a resolution adopted by the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 27th day of May, 1914, creating Sewer District No. 2, Section 3, and designating and declaring the real property herein-after described as included in and comprising said District, and in pursuance of a Resolution duly adopted by said Commission on the 27th day of May, 1914, whereby said City Commission determined the necessity of and declared its intention to improve said District and all the real property included therein as hereinafter described by laying therein a sewer and in pursuance of the Report of the Committee on Estimates, heretofore made in relation thereto, and adopted by said Commission, the City Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, will meet at the Commission Chamber of said City on the 8th day of July, 1914, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock, P. M. of said day, and consider the levy of a special assessment against all the real property benefitted or affected by said proposed improvement, and grant a hearing before said Commission to all persons feeling aggrieved on account of said proposed levy of said special assessment to pay the costs and expenses thereof.

That the boundaries of the district to be benefitted or affected by such proposed improvement are as follows to-wit:

Beginning at a point on the center line of North Depot St., which is north 100 feet from the north property line of "Y" Avenue, the boundary line runs thence south along the center line of North Depot Street to a point 125 feet south of the southwest property line of Jackson Avenue; thence northwesterly 100 feet from and parallel with the southwest property line of Jackson Avenue to the center line of north Fourth Street; thence north along the center line of North Fourth Street to a point 100 feet north of the
