where blood leaked through when the dead man fell in the vestibule. The remark credited to the robber who got away, may have, in the excitement been said by the victim in the intermission between the shot in the side and the one which struck him in the head.

Definite facts have been hard to get in the confusion of rumors and wild reports circulated. Until the arrival of the officials who have been on the trail, and definite reports from the train crew, it will be hard to learn the precise facts of all details in connection with the incident.

Fourth Man Near.

There is every reason to believe that there was an accomplice in the hold-up. Horse tracks are plainly visible in the road near the tracks, and the fugitives were undoubtedly mounted when they left the scene.

Baker Prescription Found.

There was nothing on the dead man's person that has been made public save a prescription blank filled out at the Bodinson drug store in Baker. There were other papers taken from the body but these were kept secret for detectives to work with.

The dead man was taken to Pendleton on No. 5 and then brought back to Meacham again, but later in the day sent back to Pendleton.

Suspects Seen Here.

Two suspects were quizzed by officers early this morning in La Grande, though they proved an alibi. They were of a size that might correspond with the robbers, and the fact that lead to their scrutiny was the extreme amount of dust which they carried on their clothes and hands when entering the Blue Mountain hotel. They washed up just before No. 17 arrived this morning. Nate Zeifel called the attention of Deputy Sheriff Williamson to the men and they were closely questioned. The night clerk at the hotel was called into the questioning and said the men arrived on No. 5 last night and went to bed. They "beat" their way out of here on No. 17.

Another Couple Seen.

J. K. Wright saw two men who answer the description as to size and to head gear, drop off an incoming freight at the North Second street

crossing about 10:30. One of the two men limped considerably.

Local railroad officials were notified by Mr. Wright and the police department took up that clew. The men were wearing shirts and suits that did not correspond with those seen at the robbery however.

Posse Organized Early.

A posse was organized in La Grande at 3 o'clock this morning. Superintendent William Bollons, Assistant Superintendents J. F. Corbett and Dick Buckley headed the O-W. delegation. Sheriff Hug and Deputy Rees and Chief of Police Orsi were some of the peace officials who went out with Special Detective Hannan for the O-W.

Ritter Takes Picture.

J. H. Ritter of this city was roused at the early hour and taken aboard the special train carrying the officials and he took several pictures of the dead man.

Getchell Likeness Asserted.

Although the rumor is unfounded, it was reported today that the picture was a likeness of "Babe" Getchell who formerly lived here. The dead man is not Getchell however.

The famous bloodhound, Tracy, now owned by Jake Jacobson a local engineer, but at one time belonged to the penitentiary at Boise and which was used in running down Harry Tracy the outlaw, was taken to the scene of the robbery this morning. Mr. Jacobson, besides the noted bloodhound, owns several other valuable dogs and these were put on the trail.

Johnson Was Engineer.

Fred Johnson of this city, was the engineer of the train. His fireman was H. W. Smith, and both men were locked in the car while the robbing was going on.

Headed For Starkey.

Early reports from Meacham indicate that the robbers headed for the Starkey district and the posses were reported to be headed that way this noon.

A Pendleton man, who saw three suspicious strangers near Kamela last night, arrived in La Grande today on No. 6. He was out late last night and was striking a match to find his way when the flare of the light surprised three men standing about him. He was asked roughly what he was doing and after considerable quizzing was allowed to go on. Today he was taken to Meacham to identify the dead man, and feels certain the fellow was among the three who surprised him at Kamela.

One of the men who escaped was five feet 10 inches and weighed about 175 pounds. He wore a dark coat and brown shirt. The other was five feet six and weighed 150 pounds. He had a dark coat, white shirt and both wore dark caps and overalls. The dead man was also dressed in overalls, and the pictures which Mr. Ritter brought back to La Grande show his arm to have been tattooed. A picture of a bathing girl is worked on his right arm, and the corpse was held up on a slab in such a way that the tattoo mark shows plainly.

The pictures have been in big demand today.

Booty Apparently Small.

According to officials \$240 and some cheap jewelry were secured from the small express safe the main express safe was not touched. The booty taken from passengers is not expected to total more than a couple of hundred dollars as only a few were in the three coaches.

Henry Sears of Pendleton said this afternoon while in La Grande that when he saw the three men at Kamela, they were in company with a Russian tramp. The four started a camp fire and Mr. Sears says it was 20 minutes past 11 last night when he saw them.

Sears says that the Russian is now held by the authorities at Meacham pending further developments. The Russian professes to know nothing of the identity of the three men, saying they started a camp fire together last evening, and that nothing was seen of any horses. He claims to know nothing about the time that the men left him, yet he is confident that the dead man is one of those with him in camp last night.

The story about a brown automobile without a number is a false theory, thin's Mr. Sears. He is confident their escape was made by horses.

The officials evidently have some doubt about the Russian's story as they are holding him for complete investigation as to what he knows, if anything, about the men he camped with.

The special train which has on it the officials from La Grande is due to arrive here shortly after 4 this evening.

A reward of \$1,000 has been offered by the O-W. for the capture of the robbers.
