TALBOTT WINS FOR CONSULSHIP

RATE QUESTION HOLDS ATTENTION AT CLOSE.

Foresters At Head Camp of Woodmen Break Camp and Go Home.

Toledo, June 30.—(Special.)—Fight over the rates of insurance to be adopted for the ensuing administration was before the head camp of Modern Woodmen Saturday afternoon.

Senator Cleary of Illinois, and E. S. Smith, his colleague, presented entire new tables for adoption.

Retrenchment policies in the salaries and expenses heretofore accorded the head officers were defeated after a sharp debate headed by Wisconsin delegates. The vote was 120 to 300 against the changes advocated.

Clear Record of Charges.
In opening the session Floor Leader J. O. Davis of California, urged that the latter of the previous day, characterizing the head officers at Rock Island as a "criminal gang of Rock Island" be expunged. This was done. The camp decided in the per diem payments that delegates expressly instructed at a state convention might accept a lower rate of mileage than voted by the camp if they saw fit.

May Hold Over Till Monday.
Whether the sessions will end Saturday seems doubtful. With the opposition gaining headway against the present rates offered by the committee, it is possible the delegates may not finish before Monday.

One incident creating merriment in the convention was the breaking of a chair on the rostrum. The officer in his fall to the floor unseated four other officers and all fell in a heap.
