gave her such applause that she was

compelled to return and sing again. The numbers were excellent selections and the singer's voice rose and died away in soft, sweet strains. Momentary silence followed her last number, which shows the attentive appreciation the audience gave her. Mrs. Miller will be heard regularly during the week.

After Mrs. Miller's solos, the speaker of the evening, Dr. Ng Poon Chew, Litt. D., the noted Chinese editor and scholar of San Francisco, was introduced. This was Dr. Chew's second appearance before the Chautauqua patrons of La Grande, he having been secured for the second engagement at the urgent request of many who heard his speech last year. Dr. Chew's address was on the "New Chinese Republic."

The Chinese republic is only two years and seven months old and although it had been founded upon the true American spirit of liberty, it is hardly yet more than an experiment, an experiment which only time will test, asserted Mr. Chew. "For governments act very slowly and it takes decades to change a whole race while a few leading individuals may be able to conceive reforms in a short time," he continued. "The formation of the republic was an effort to establish American liberty in China and to realize a government of the people, by the people and for the people, instead of a government of the people, by the rulers for the rich."

He went on to say that Americans are apt to forget their own history of struggles for stable government and personal liberty. "It took you Americans over 75 years to learn the worth of 'united we stand, divided we fall.' China can't establish in 40 minutes what it took America all those years to accomplish. It simply can't be done. America's problems were only those of construction, while my people must face the additional difficulties of reconstruction. They must tear down before they build up."

"China's crying need today is for money. Taxation without representation is tyranny; but representation without taxation is anarchy. I don't

see why you Americans are making such a cry over currency reform. Why in China you never know how much money you have, for every province has its own currency, different from all the others. China needs a gold standard—no 16 to 1 policy goes with us.

"China is the cradle of American liberty, for 40 years the young men and women of China have been learning of American civilization and culture in the colleges of this country. As a result of the returned indemnity of the United States to China for damages due to the Boxer uprising, the entire \$14,000,000 is now being resented in American schools by the young men and women of the new republic.

"The new reforms have caused a great economic disturbance throughout the country, and the people who look only at the empty stomach are crying for a restoration of the good old times. But although it is hard on a few, for the present they cannot stop the inevitable. The march of civilization cannot be turned back.

"Two of the greatest curses ever inflicted upon any race have been the opium trade which has taken the vitality of China's manhood to fill the coffers of Great Britain, and the binding of women's feet, which has inflicted untold misery upon the Chinese women, besides nullifying their usefulness in doing the nation's work. These two curses are now being successfully dealt with and in a few years will be no more.

"But political, economic, social and financial remedies alone will not free China. Man is mere flesh and bones, and the innerman—the spirit—must be taken care of. The old religions of China have remained lifeless for thousands of years and today are being neglected by the entire younger generations. Christianity is rapidly taking their place, and by its help may China succeed in her tremendous tasks before her.

"When China has established her republic, she with her many people, America with its wealth, China with its love of peace, and America with its

love of justice, may call a halt to the hostilities between other nations and be the controlling factors in establishing the universal fraternity of man," he concluded.

But La Grande grew, as did Union county and Alloway county. More business came and of late years it has managed to keep its head above water, running at little if any loss.

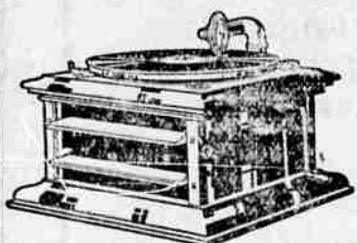
Now that an addition must be erected, there comes another problem of financing. In order to assist in this undertaking the hospital board has issued what is termed a "Grande Ronde Hospital Ticket," which, for a stipulated amount protects the purchaser in case of sickness, giving him medical attention, medicines, surgery if needed with room, board and nurse hire at the institution.

It is a form of insurance and seems popular with all who have been solicited. It is the intention to sell these hospital tickets in the two counties.

In speaking of this undertaking one of the hospital board stated to a reporter for the Observer: "The Grande Ronde hospital never has been the recipient of charitable favors. While Medford, through her commercial club raised several thousand dollars to aid in locating a hospital there, and many other Oregon cities were doing the same thing, La Grande's institution was plodding along with the medical fraternity carrying the load. It has needed assistance many times, and now that the community must have increased capacity in the hospital we have issued the hospital tickets to assist in this improvement. Every purchaser is protected to the fullest during the life of his ticket and it is, therefore, a business proposition and not a donation, yet at the same time the sale of a large number of these tickets will help the institution over a rough place in the road."
