# "BLOODSHED" WAR NEARING

CLATSOP BEACH DRILL FIELD THIS YEAR.

Maneuvers to Open July 12 for All Branches of Militia, ..

Portland, Ore., July 6.—Clatsop Beach resorts will be unusually gay during the midsummer season, due to the mobilizing of three thousand troops, embracing the United States regulars from Fort Vancouver, the Idaho National guard and the Oregon National guard. The arrangements have been for the maneuvers which will continue over a period of 14 days, commencing July 12. The general encampment will be near Gearhart Park, overlooking the Pacific ocean.

Every branch of the military service will be represented and will be seen practicing in bloodless warfare. The opportunity will be afforded summer colonists and visitors at the near by beach resorts to be spectators of the various operations of the nation's defenders. Part of the maneuvers take place on the broad oceanside meadows where a golf course is laid. Back of the meadows is a fringe of forest, also creeks, hills and a country of varied topography which is admirably adapted, say the military experts for mimic war.

There will be artillery, cavalry, signal and hospital branches of the service; also three regimental bands of from 35 to 40 pieces each. The martial display, band concerts, drills, fetes and receptions and other social activities are expected to draw immense throngs to the recreation retreats of the Clatsop Beach section.

### Auto Is Burned.

Dr. H. A. Shaeffer's automobile was burned Saturday night when the owner and three friends were driving along the road near the J. A. Eggleston farm, says the Enterprise Chief-tain. Everything combustible on the car was burned and nearly all the remaining parts were spoiled. Dr. Shaeffer bought the machine, a Cadillac, in the spring.

In the early evening Dr. and Mrs. Shaeffer and Mr. and Mrs. Nottingham had been to Joseph. On the return, A. M. Pace, W. R. Nicholson and A. W. Haggerty met the dentist on the street and asked him for a ride. He said he would take them around the loop, out on the river road, past the Bauer and Long farms, and back by Prairie creek. But the car was runnig smoothly and passed the corner where the turn should have been made. Dr. Shaeffer said he would turn north at the Jones corner.

A moment later flames shot out of the front of the machine. It was stopped and the passengers got out and tried to extinguish the fire. They met with no success, and then, fearing an explosion when the flames reached the gasoline tank, they ran away a distance of 100 yards and waited.

The fire burned out but there was no explosion. An examination the next morning showed the gasoline tank empty. The front wheels did not seem to have been injured and the engine showed no effects of the fire or heat. Oil and grease still covered the iron parts, but the rear of the machine was totally wrecked.

It is the theory of those familiar with the car that a leak developed in the gasoline supply pipe. This leak apparently had nearly emptied the tank when the fire started. A trail of fire was first seen on the ground when the car was moved, after it had been first stopped. This, it is believed, was burning gasoline which dripped to the road. Just what started the fire is unknown. All four men were smoking and it is conjectured a spark or match may have fallen through the pedal slot in the floor and thus ignited the gasoline. There was no insurance on the machine.

game" is the object of the camps. Students from many colleges will spend a month's vacation receiving martial instruction. Infantry, cavalry and bands, with special trained officers have been assigned to the camps, at which places a short course in military instruction, including target practice, will be given.

The students will, as at West Point, be on a cadet status. Medals for marksmanship among the students are to be awarded by the National Rifle association.

### Oriental Problem Up At Convention.

St. Paul, Minn., July 6.—Responsibilities of educators for the solution the the Oriental problem was to be one of the important subjects discussed at the meetings of the National Educational association which today opened its annual convention here. Prominent educators from all sections of the country were present at

today's opening session. Dr. Sidney L. Gulick was to be the speaker on the Oriental problem. He advocates instruction into geographies, histories and other text books, such as will give American children and youth more correct ideas as to Asiatic peoples, and develop in this way a proper attitude of respect and good will. Declaring that "the prosperity of America depends to a large extent upon the presense, the right treatment and the happiness of the immigrant here," Dr. Gulick urged that the children be taught to look with good will upon immigrants of all classes.

### Naval Militia On Cruise.

Old Point Comfort, Va., July 6.—With the naval militia of North Carolina and the District of Columbia on board, the battleship Rhode Island left Fortress Monroe today for the annual cruise.

The Rhode Island is to proceed to

Lower Delaware Bay where the Pennsylvania naval militia and the New Jersey second batallion will be taken aboard. From lower Delaware Bay the Rhode Island goes to Bermuda for two days and then to Tangier Sound for three days target practice and service drill.

### Expect Receivership Lifted.

Wichita, Kan., July 6.—The receivership under which the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railway has been operated for more than two years was expected to be lifted today when the road was placed on sale by order of Judge Pollock of the Kansas City Federal Court.

Six million dollars was asked and a reorganization committee of stockholders were the only bidders as the sale was perfunctory, but necessary to remove the receivership. Work will be started immediately to extend the road from here to Kansas City.
