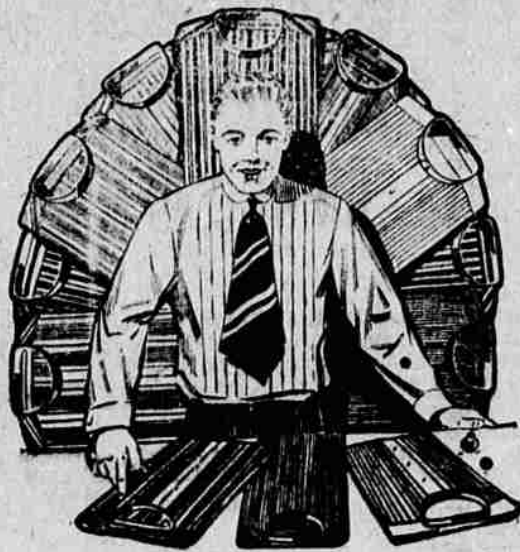

KNIGHTS WILL HAVE LOVEFEST

LESSON OF FRIENDSHIP IN DRAMATIC FORM.

All Knights in the City Invited to Be Present Monday Evening.

Next Monday evening will be a big night for Red Cross Lodge No. 27, Knights of Pythias. Local imitators of citizens of ancient Syracuse will put on a dramatized form of the lesson of friendship, dealing with the famous historical episode between Damon and Pythias on the one hand and the scheming senators of Syracuse on the other hand. Seven speaking parts appear in the "lesson." This is to be similar to the drama which the Enterprise lodge put on in such splendid form.

This number, coupled with several others to interest Pythians, will lead up to the first annual roll call. All members of Red Cross No. 27, and visiting Knights are invited to be present on this occasion.

Uncle Sam Takes Space at Exposition. San Francisco, Dec. 22.—With the insurance of a permit for 60,000 square feet of exhibit space in the Palace of Liberal Arts, negotiations for the United States government display at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition have just been completed here. This is the largest amount of exhibit space to be occupied by any governmental exhibit at this or any other previous universal exposition.

The display will include exhibits of naval and military education, practice of military and naval medicine, office of Indian affairs, Department of Commerce and Labor, Land Department, which has the administra-

tion of all the public parks, reservations and other public lands; Federal Department of Health, Reclamation Service, Government Printing office, census bureau, American Red Cross, Isthmian Canal Commission and numerous others.

In addition to the displays in the Palace of Liberal Arts, the Federal Government will be represented by exhibits in the Palace of Mines and Metallurgy, the Palace of Social Economy and Education and elsewhere in the exposition.
