YEE YUEN RETURNS

Former Baker Chinese Merchant has Been in Oriental Home.

Baker, Dec. 23.—Yee Yuen, a former prominent Chinese merchant of Baker, has returned to this city after a year's absence in China. He declares China is in a state of revolt and foment which has absolutely paralyzed the country and that a certain element, seeking to take advantage of the European war, has attempted to throw off the yoke of Yuan Shi Kai. The result he said, has been a condition akin to chaos.

Yee Yuen left Baker a year ago, expecting to find a great industrial development in his native land but he found instead that, industrially China is at a standstill and that militarism is not far behind conditions in Europe. He returned to Baker broken in health and declared that he would live here always, saying that he does not want to see China again.
