Mrs. James H. Graham, of Baker, is reported little improved from her illness. She is a sister of Mrs. George Parker of La Grande.

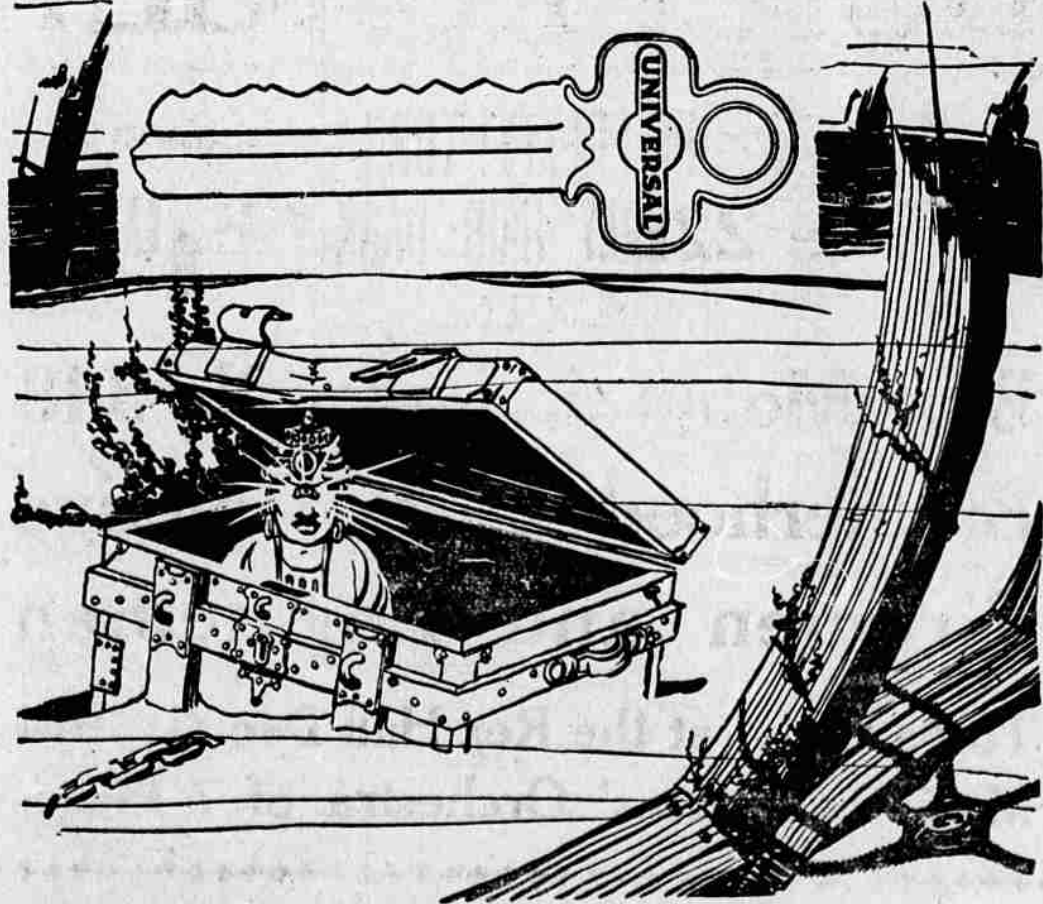
