SCHOOL FAIR IS A SUCCESS

**'CARNIVAL SPIRIT PREVAILS AT
WALLOWA "STUNT."**

Cold Spell Ends at Wallowa-Other
Wallowa News.

Wallowa, Ore., Dec. 27.—(Special.)—The carnival held here in the gymnasium Tuesday night was a success, as everything was done in a satisfactory manner. The gymnasium was packed with people by eight o'clock, and the carnival continued until about eleven.

There were booths where popcorn, candy, peanuts, cider, ice cream, high school peanuts and etc., were sold, and side shows where the wild man, and other animals were on exhibition, and also the "Photy Graft" gallery, fish pond, and etc. An orchestra played music during the evening, and the "Dixie Chorus" of the high school sang several selections, and a mock concert band also helped to entertain the crowd. Confetti was sold, and by the time the carnival was over, the floor was covered with it. The escape of the wild man during the latter part of the evening, created a great deal of amusement.

Most all of the high school students and some of the grade pupils masked, and this made more interest in the carnival.

The Juniors have both the boy's and girl's class champions. The Junior girls beat the Sophs, 10 to 8, and for the boy's game only one of the seniors appeared, and so the game was forfeited to the Juniors. The first game of the season is with the Jo-

seph high school. This game will be played here in the gymnasium, on Tuesday night.

The cold spell has at last ended and the thermometer rose above the freezing point Saturday. About four inches of snow fell Saturday, and the indications are that it will continue to stay warmer. ENTERPRISE IS FREEZING.

Prolonged Seige of Cold Weather Does
Damage at Wallowa.

Enterprise, Dec. 26.—The Chieftain says that from December 6 to the present the temperature has been at or below zero every morning. The lowest any morning has been 15 below. Seldom has such a prolonged spell of extreme cold been known in the county. In fact many old residents say it is quite unprecedented. Persons who have been here 30 years assert they can recall nothing to equal it.

Not only have the nights been very severe, but the days also have been cold. The sun has shone brightly and there has not been a breath of wind stirring, but still there was no melting. The snow has remained where it fell, light and flaky, as it comes down when the temperature is low. The roads are dusty, where traveled heavily. In ordinary years, mud is common after light snows, which melt rapidly

in the bright sun.

Much damage has been done everywhere to vegetables and fruit in cellars, few of which can resist such steady cold, with the ground covered by only a couple of inches of snow. Many and many a cellar now holds a store of apples and potatoes, frozen into balls of ice. Where cellars are built under houses—as they should be—it is seldom that harm is done, as these are much warmer and safer.

For several nights the Enterprise Electric company was unable to furnish a full current, on account of the shutting down of the Wallowa plant. The current was sufficient for day use, but when night came the lights were dim, and after early evening, street lights in all the towns were shut off, to give the best possible service to the homes. The Enterprise plant was kept running and furnished electricity for the entire system. Ordinarily the Enterprise plant runs day and night and the Wallowa plant is added at night to take care of the extra demand on account of lighting.

The trouble at Wallowa was that the flume through which water runs to the plant, was choked with ice and snow. This has been shoveled out and all is now working well. However, a new cause of anxiety has arisen in the decreased flow of water in the flumes and streams, due to the extreme cold. This has not become a serious menace to the service yet.
