Native Sons Plan Selling Laws.

San Francisco, Dec. 29.—Confident
that the hour has struck for sweep-
ing reforms in the retail distribution
of intoxicating liquors in California,
the California Grape Protective asso-
ciation, through Attorney Theodor
Bell, has announced its intentions to
take the initiative in a legislative re-
form program. This is to be done de-
spite the fact that California voters
overwhelmingly defeated a proposed
prohibition amendment to the state
constitution in the November elec-
tions. The legislative program which
the association hopes to put through
is as follows:

County option, except in cities hav-
ing 5,000 or more inhabitants; in
licensed territory, not more than one
saloon for each 1,000 inhabitants or
major fraction thereof, exclusive of
table licenses for hotels and restaur-
ants; separate licenses to sell malt
and fermented liquors, as distinguish-
ed from distilled liquors, no saloon
license to be issued to an individual,
but only to property, under heavy
bond, to be responsible for the faith-
ful observance of the law, unlawful
for any wine maker, brewer, distiller
or wholesaler to have any pecuniary
interest in a saloon, midnight and
Sunday closing; anti-treat law; dras-
tic laws concerning the sale of intoxi-
cating liquor to minors, women or to
persons in an intoxicated or partially
intoxicated condition; such limitations
and restrictions respecting the grant-
ing of licenses in license territory as
will forever eliminate dives and dead-
falls.

GRAND JURORS FILE REPORT

CONCLUDING SESSION HELD
THIS MORNING.

Thirteen True Bills of Indictments
Found—Finds License Flaw.

Claiming that warehouse license
laws are being violated and returning
13 true bills, the grand jury convened
last week, today filed its final report.
The report in toto, is:

Grand Jury Report.

We the undersigned grand jury for
the October term, 1914, at the pres-
ent session, beg leave to make the
following report of our doings:

We have been in session for four
full days and have returned into court
13 true bills of indictment and two
not true bills of indictment.

That we have carefully investigated
all matters properly brought to our
attention, and have no unfinished
business at this time.

In the course of our proceedings
we have discovered that there are
persons and corporations in this
county, receiving grain for storage,
and that such persons and corpora-
tions have failed to procure any
license, or give any bond as provided
by law. That we earnestly insist that
it is the duty of the county court to
ascertain who are engaged in receiv-
ing grain for storage, and have fail-
ed to comply with such provision of
the law, and in order that the per-
sons leaving grain in storage may be
fully protected, that the county court
requires a strict compliance with the
law and enforce the penalty of \$50.00
per day for every day such person,
partnership or corporation fails to
provide the necessary lines for re-
ceiving and storing grain.

In closing this session we wish to
expressly state our individual appre-
ciation of the many acts of kindness
and consideration we have received
from the court. And we feel greatly
indebted to the district attorney for
his patient and careful assistance in
procuring and submitting proof of
any and all matters we have desired
to investigate. Our bailiff has been
faithful and attentive, and all of-
ficials have given us all information
and help at any time requested.
