BAKER HAS NEW CHIEF

POLICE CHIEF RILEY RETIRES FROM SERVICE.

Deputy Sheriff Made Chief—Other Appointments for Year Made.

Baker, Dec. 29.—Ed Jackson, deputy sheriff, was today appointed chief of police of the city of Baker by Mayor Palmer and his appointment was confirmed by unanimous vote of the city commissioners. In making the appointment Mayor Palmer paid a warm tribute to outgoing Chief of Police Riley who did not apply for reappointment and who had notified Mayor Palmer that he expects to take up a different vocation in the spring.

"Mr. Riley's official services have, to my mind, been decidedly satisfactory," said Mayor Palmer. "He has worked hard and faithfully and has done efficient work. His present illness is due to his hard and faithful work. He has stayed out in the cold air at nights and has worked hard when he should have been in bed."

Mr. Jackson was chief of police in Baker for four years and eight months until six years ago. He was first appointed by Mayor R. D. Carter and served under him for eight months and was then appointed by Mayor Charles A. Johns under whom he served for four years. For the last six years, until last April, he was steward at the Elk's club. Since April first he has been deputy sheriff under Sheriff Ed Rand.

Mr. Jackson, the mayor said today, had not applied for the appointment. He was surprised when told that he had been appointed and announced that he would accept the appointment.
