LA GRANDE MEN IN CLUB SHOW UP WELL.

Albert Gillette Draws Four Encore. Football Pictures Good.

Happily mixed from music classics to football ditties, and interspersed with campus scenes and film reproduction of the memorable game of football at Corvallis, November 21, the program presented by the University of Oregon Glee club last evening to an appreciative audience at Sherry's theatre, was received with the highest comments by La Grande critics. The consensus of opinions is that the numbers excel in finish and polish previous efforts of the warblers from Eugene. Aside from the fact that La Grande has been fond of the U. of O. club because for several years in succession La Grande men have been prominent in it—aside from this fact, be it repeated, La Grande always listens to the Christmas holiday program with keen interest.

The program goes with a bang from the start. The ensemble numbers by the club are good, showing splendid control of good voices. The arrangement is such as to give plenty of light college airs to top off the "heavier" numbers used at intervals. While the ensemble is good, it is really the individuals that make the club what it is. Paul Sprague's tenor solo, "Songs of Araby," (by Rhys-Herbert), William Vawter's baritone number, "Song of the Sword," taken from the opera Tofano (by Clough-Leighter), and Albert Gillette's baritone solos stand out as musical renditions of first class calibre. It was not to the disparagement of either Mr. Vawter or Mr. Sprague that Al. Gillette was called back four times—he was the popular idol of the individual stags and the house was loth to let him retire. These three are worth while vocalists.

Vern Apperson handles the Xylophone with apt skill, giving the "Poet and Peasant" overture as his introductory number and responding with several lively airs.

The only adverse criticism that a La Grande audience could make to the program as given was the non-appearance of Henry Hsidenrich in solo work. The local boy's splendid basso rounded out the quartet in marked musical precision, and La Grande would like to hear "Heinie" alone—it had to be content to see him twice in quartet appearances and to the quartet must be handed a bouquet on a golden tray; no better music has been put forth by any four collegian singers in La Grande.

In the "stunts" department, La Grande was keenly interested too, and well repaid. Merlin Batley, a graduate of La Grande high, and Bert Jerard of Pendleton have a line of funny stuff that unquestionably gets by anywhere. Overlooking the local interest in the two boys, the features of the "Tempus Fugit" are many and good. Mr. Batley's facial pantomime on a picture show fan ranks high as a bit of art in the entertaining line.

Thus, in touching each department of the club's endeavor, there is nothing one might say to detract or discourage—it is a good club, well voiced, well directed and well taught.

La Grande was treated to a special feature of the program which no other Eastern Oregon city got—it was done to show the deep appreciation of past receptions to the club in La Grande. Nearly the complete details of the game of foot ball between Oregon and O. A. C. at Corvallis November 21, was reproduced in film form, showing with marked clearness the features of the players, how the field goals were kicked, and giving all-in-all, a first class substitution for a seat on the sidelines. During the film representation and during various slide scenes thrown on the screen, the Oregon lov esongs and Oregon "spirit" carols were warbled by the singers.

Come as often as they may, Oregon's glee club will be a welcome guest in La Grande at any time.
