BUTTER DROPS WITH NEW YEAR

FIVE CENT DROP RECORDED ON CREAMERY AND RANCH

Drop in Price is Due to Unusually Open Winter Season.

With the advent of the new year comes the welcome news—to the consumer—of a material drop in the price of butter. The butter market has been unsteady for some time past and the price on two pound rolls was lowered five cents a couple of weeks ago, but not until today did the expected drop materialize. The decline in the price of this commodity at this time of the year, a rather unusual occurrence, is due to the unusual open winter season which has flooded the market with ranch butter. Creamery butter is now quoted at 35 cents a pound and 70 cents for the two-pound roll, and ranch butter is selling at 30 and 60 cents.

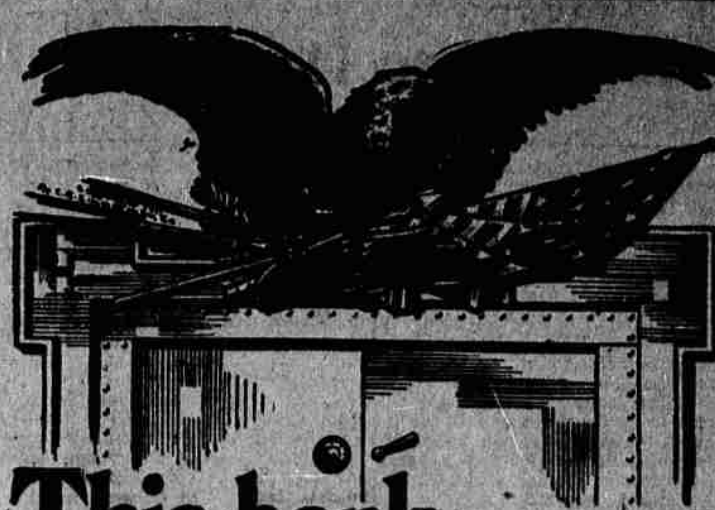
