WALLOWA IN PIPES' GRIP

FROZEN MAINS GIVE MUCH TROUBLE.

Steam from a Tractor Used to Fairly Good Success in the War.

Wallowa, Jan. 4.—(Special).—Though the extremely cold weather

seems to have ended, a large percent of the water pipes in the city are frozen, and there seems to be no immediate prospect of obtaining relief. A few of the mains have been thawed out, by having the steam from a traction engine, forced into the hydrants, but in one or two instances, even this failed to thaw them. On account of the small pipes that extend to the residences, freezing many people are getting water from the river.
