SCENE IN PORTSMOUTH HARBOR, NEAR WHERE FORMIDABLE WAS SUNK.



This is a scene in Portsmouth harbor, the most important rendezvous of the British navy in the war, off which the battleship Formidable was sunk by a German submarine or mine. The fact that the Germans approached so near the southern base of the British fleet has spread uneasiness through the United Kingdom. Were it possible for a submarine to enter

the harbor it might attack a half-dozen battleships. The Formidable sank in a heavy storm. More than 600 of the crew went down with her. The loss of the vessel herself is not of great importance to the British navy, for the reason that she was of the pre-dreadnaught type and was manned with old guns. But the officers and men on board could not be well spar-

ed. It has been the policy of the admiralty to keep the dreadnoughts of the navy within harbors, away from chance of sinking by the German submarines. The ships of lesser importance, like the Formidable and the cruisers, have been sent on duty in the open sea. The larger battleships have been held for the time when the German navy may break from its base.
