Butter Prices Are Firm With Supply
Extra Plentiful.

With the hens of the Grande Ronde valley working overtime in an effort to counterbalance the upward trend of other food products, eggs this morning are selling at five cents a dozen less than yesterday's prices, retailers quoting strictly fresh eggs at 40 cents a dozen. The egg supply continues extra good for this season of the year with the demand rather under normal due to the high prices.

Butter prices are holding their own with a plentiful supply of ranch product on the market.

Tools of the Ancients.

Of the materials used by the ancients
in making tools nothing is known, nor
are the methods employed by them
known, but we do know that their
tools for stone work were equal to
anything in use by us.

They used both solid and tubular
drills and straight and circular saws.
The drills were set with jewels, prob-
ably corundum, and even lathe tools
had such cutting edges. So remark-
able was the quality of the tubular
drills, it is said, and the skill of the
workmen that the cutting marks in
the hard granite gave no indication of
the wear of the tool, while a cut of a
tenth part of an inch was made in the
hardest rock at each revolution, and a
hole through both the hardest and soft-
est material was bored perfectly
smooth and uniform throughout.

Lynch Law.

the administration of justice into its

the lynch law.

The name "Lynch" was that of a
United States planter of the eighteenth
century who undertook on his own ac-
count to support the government of his
