FORMAL OPENING OF GYMNASIUM DOESN'T BLOCK ALL.

Many Lines to Be Carried on as Before Retrenchment Policy.

Considerable confusion seems to have arisen over the announcement last week of the resignation of R. J. Clark as secretary of the Y. M. C. A. and the postponement of the opening of the building to the public.

Mr. John H. Rudd, who is now again in charge of the association's interests here, stated this morning that he expected to open the building by February 1st for work in calisthenics, gymnastics and athletic games, and that the shower baths, and possibly the plunge would be available for use at that time. The business office of the association will be moved into the new building as soon as possible and the main lobby and reading rooms thrown open to the public.

According to this arrangement while a great deal of work will devolve upon the secretary the building will be opened to a great deal of work at this time, the formal opening being postponed, however, until about September 1st when the social rooms, dormitories and other departments of the building will be opened to use. Mr. Rudd stated this morning that he hoped to arrange a schedule in calisthenics to include business and professional men, young men, high school boys and boys of the grade school age, and a class for the ladies, which will be in charge of a lady, probably Miss Lucrece Wood.
