CLUB ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

EXHAUSTIVE WAR ON CARNIVEROUS BIRDS ON.

L. M. Hoyt is Elected President—Other Business Transacted.

Annual election of officers and awards of the club's prizes for various lines of endeavor during the year, were transacted by the membership of the Wing, Pin & Fleetfoot club last evening commencing at 6:30 o'clock.

Annual reports of the treasurer and secretary were very flattering and showed judicious expenditure of considerable sums of money.

Hoyt is President. L. M. Hoyt was re-elected president. He finished out the unexpired year last season, and was immediately put back in office when the first year was up. The other officials as elected last night are:

Vice President, P. A. Foley; treasurer, Charles R. Harding; secretary, A. A. Wenzel; executive committee, W. E. Leffel, Walter Zweifel, S. D. Crowe and P. A. Foley.

Maggie Awards Made. Walter Zweifel captured the prize for shooting the most magpies during the past year. Since its existence the club has offered handsome prizes and individuals have done likewise, to the members of the club who slay the most carnivorous birds during the year. Crows rank as magpies. Mr. Zweifel killed 134 magpies and 18 crows. Chas. Buesing killed 40 magpies and 10 crows. Ed Myersick slew 11 magpies and Nate Zweifel two. A total of 187 magpies and 28 crows were thus registered as dead during the year. P. A. Foley had offered a prize of \$5.00 and the club \$5.00, all of which Mr. Zweifel won.

Increase Effort Next Year. Five or six handsome prizes have already been hung up for the magpie campaign next year, and it is expected that interest in the contest will spread to a great extent.

Membership Dues Sought. The officials reported last evening that 162 members of the club were in good standing on the close of 1914, but that 50 or more were behind in their dues. As the only lubrication which the financial wheels of the club get is that which comes from dues, the officials and executive committee last evening started a campaign to have the members pay their 1915 dues of \$1.00 each. At least two banquets will be given during the year, either one of which will easily be worth the year's dues, and in addition the prompt payment of dues insures the executive committee power to proceed with the various activities which he club undertakes. EIGHTEEN BILLS IN.

First Real Day of Business Swamped With New Measures.

Salem, Jan. 12.—Eighteen bills were introduced in the senate today. There was a rush of economy bills and the most important of these was one by Senator Barret, of Union, Umatilla, and Morrow counties, creating the department of Labor and consolidating therein the offices of Labor Commissioner, Industrial Welfare Commission, Industrial Accident Commission, and Board of Inspectors of Child Labor. The bill provides that the head of the departments shall be two directors with an annual salary of \$2,500.

The Senate today completed organization with the announcement of committees. Chairmanship of six committees went to Multnomah county.

In the house 26 bills were introduced. They covered almost every subject from prohibition to hay. There are numerous tax measures and bills aimed at abuses of commercial fishing.

Kiddle Fares Well.

With the appointment of committees today, Senator Kiddle of La Grande was well recognized in appointments. He was made chairman of the insurance committee and was appointed on the following: banking, industries, public lands, railroads, roads and highways.
