COACH CADETS TO KNOW STATE

O. A. C. GUIDES AT FAIR ARE IN-STRUCTED.
Twelve Lectures to be Delivered to Them Before Their Departure.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 15.—Young men of the Agricultural College who will serve as guides of the Oregon building at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, are being coached for the most satisfactory discharge of their duties while on duty in showing visitors about the building. It has been recognized both by the Oregon fair commission and by the College authorities that many visitors of the Exposition will be deeply interested in the possibilities of desirable homes offered by Oregon. It is also to be expected that these visitors will be eager to ask questions about our climate, soil and resources and that in order to make a creditable showing for the state it is necessary that the guides have a fund of special information from which to make truthful and attractive answers. This information is being supplied them in a series of twelve special lectures.

These lectures deal with soils, topography, rainfall, and general climatic conditions. Special agricultural lines are also made prominent features about which information is given. Information about the people of Oregon including numbers, distribution, and religious, educational and social conditions, is quite necessarily included. General agricultural conditions were treated in a comprehensive way by Dean A. B. Cordley, director of the Oregon Experiment station. This was followed by specialists in soils, and crops, farm livestock, dairy and dairy production, fruit, poultry, range and timber conditions. When it is considered that the students are likely to be called upon to answer such definite questions as number of farms in Oregon, number of farm owners, amount and value of leading field, orchard and garden crops, number and

value of horses, cattle sheep, and hogs, and the general distribution of all these interests, the gigantic nature of the task that is undertaken becomes apparent.

Domestic subjects as well as those of social organizations, schools churches and colleges, have also received much attention in this preparatory work. The final lectures of the series will be a resume of the educational system of Oregon by President W. J. Kerr.
