Edibles Still in Demand for Charity
Distribution.

It is a source of great joy that the plan hit upon by the Christian church to effectually meet the needs of those in distress is doing what its friends hoped for it. The people of this city are not slow to respond and articles of clothing keep coming from many sources.

The distribution center at Fir and Monroe streets is a busy place. The machinery necessary to attend to the distribution while done entirely by volunteer labor is reaching those in need and getting better with experience. A canvass of the city revealed many cases of real need. This canvass so far has only been a partial one the cases of need found causes us to believe that many other cases are in existence that as yet we have not heard. Only a cooperative effort on the part of all interested in such work can result in reaching all in need and prevention of suffering. In my former appeal to which so many responded and to which we have reason to believe many more will respond i. e. (the giving of edibles and articles of clothing to be distributed) needs now to be seconded by an appeal to those who may have knowledge of people in need to make that known to us. Many of the very best and most modest of all our fellow citizens are in need on account of lack of employment and because they have always heretofore been able to get along on their own resources are extremely reticent about making their real needs known. Christian workers, school teachers, store keepers and others who read these lines, kindly think of some one who may be in need. Ascertain that need and make it known to us. We are making public that which we need to carry on the work; but the work of actual distribution is kept secret. We now have on hand several articles of clothing. Let those who are charitably disposed continue to send in more for this work.

"He who gives to the poor lends to the Lord." There has been little response in the way of edibles. May we not have a response along this line, as we could make good use of such things. We do not want these latter (if perishable) to be brought to headquarters as we could not insure their protection from frost etc., but simply call the writer up by phone and the article you may have to spare will be called for when needed by men who have that work in hand.
