Both Commanders Perished. A memorable sea fight in the winter of 1812 was the battle between the American ship Enterprise, 10 guns and 100 men, and the British Boxer, 14 guns and 100 men. The Enterprise was commanded by Lieutenant Burrows, the Boxer by Captain Blythe. The battle occurred Sept. 4, 1812, in the bay far from Portland, Me., and resulted in the capture of the Boxer, both commanders being killed. The two were taken into Portland on the 10th of September and anchored off the city. The coffined bodies of the two commanders were rowed ashore by the crew of both ships and after public services were buried side by side in the village cemetery. Longfellow a hundred years old and living in Portland, recalls the event in his poem "My Lost Youth," written during his visit to Portland in 1846, in which he says:

I remember the sea fight far away— How it thundered o'er the tide— And the dead captains, as they lay In their graves, overlooking the bay, Where they in battle died.
