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as barley or oat chop, and small quantities of linseed meal. Home grown feeds should be used as much as possible because these are generally the cheapest. Alfalfa and silage are hard combination to beat for successful dairying. Alfalfa is a proven crop in Union county, and in parts of the county, corn has been successfully grown. Corn does not need to be entirely ripe to be fit for silage, in fact, the best time to put corn into the silo is in the early dent stage. A cheap home-made silo can be put up to serve the purpose, and for all practical purposes will be just as good as a more expensive one. It is essential however, that these be put up right, if they are to give satisfaction.
