FROZEN PIPES FIGHT ENDED

WALLOWA'S MAINS FROZEN SATURDAY.

Constant Work With Steam Engine Has Thawed out Main Part.

Wallowa, Ore., Jan. 17.—(Special.)—As the result of constant work upon the water mains lately, most of the pipes are thawed out. This is a great relief to the people of the town for when the water pipes were frozen there would have been no chance to save a building, in case of fire. Saturday morning when the engine was thawing out a pipe in the southeast part of town, word was sent from the depot, to come there at once with the engine, as the cold weather the night before had frozen the pipes connected with the water tank, and the railroad engine could get no water. This is the first time the mains have ever frozen, and shows that the weather here this winter has been colder than the average.

RESTORING FIREMAN WITH PULMOTOR WHEN NEAR SUFFOCATION IN NEW YORK SUBWAY ACCIDENT.



More than 200 New York firemen bravely risked their lives in saving some 170 victims of an accident in the New York subway. Firemen broke through the gratings of the subway on the sidewalks and went down to find scores of passengers unconscious in trains or on the tracks. These they carried one by one to the surface. Smoke did not keep the firemen back, and most of those who went down into the dark hole were just strong enough to make their way with their burden to the surface. Dozen of them had air pumped into their lungs by the pulmotor and then insisted on going back into the tunnel to help more passengers.
