SPORTSMEN ARE TO GIVE FIGHT

STATE-WIDE MASS MEETING TO BE CALLED.

Schubel Scheme to Have Legislature
Appropriate, Opposed.

Mass meetings are to be called
throughout the state this week that
sportsmen may draft remonstrances
to the proposed scheme of turning all
licenses money over to the state treas-
ury and having the legislature ap-
propriate a lump sum for the main-
tenance of the fish and game depart-
ment. Schubel's bill, which in part
is meeting with favor, carries the
proviso stated above. This leads to
the calling of the mass meetings in
various sections of Oregon.

"A plot has been made to throw the
administration of the state fish and
game fund into politics and the hunt-
ers and fishers of the entire state will
fight it with all their strength," said
H. B. Van Duzer, president of the
Oregon Sportsmen's league, Saturday
in Portland.

"Let this plot to throw our fish
and game resources into politics be
successful and see what happens.

"The hunters and fishers of Ore-
gon want every cent of the fund de-
rived from licenses to be applied to
the work of propagating wild life and
conserving the game and fish. This
work should not be borne by general
tax but by those who fish and hunt
and they are more than willing to do
it. It should be a special purpose
fund paid by a special class to pre-
mote a special state asset."

One of the most interesting matches
the country has known will be that
of Kid Williams, bantam champion of
the United States, and Johnny Kilbane,
featherweight champion if the pro-
moters succeed in bringing them to-
gether.

An offer of \$3,000 for ten rounds
has been made to Kilbane in his home
in Cleveland. He must weigh 122
pounds at the ringside. Williams
has been boxing as the bantam cham-
pion, which requires a weight of 116
pounds. However, many persons who
have seen him recently believe he
cannot make that weight any longer.
They think that he cannot go lower
than 118. And Kilbane has recently
been climbing toward the lightweight
class, so it is not certain that he

could be in fighting condition at 122.
The two have very different styles
of fighting. Williams is a strong
younger who depends on his tremen-
dous development. Kilbane is
not built along his lines. He is a
clever boxer, who relies more on his
brains to win. He would have diffi-
culty in holding off Williams.
