CHANDLER HAS NEW BONDSMEN

Baker, Jan. 18.—Rube Chandler, out on bail awaiting trial on an indictment charging assault on T. V. Davis, the city marshal of Haines, will not have to go back to the Baker county jail to await his trial, as was expected by the local authorities when his bondsmen phoned that they would surrender him. Instead of Chandler arriving here yesterday, a new bond was received, he having secured new bondsmen after those on his bond at first had decided to turn him over.

The bondsmen being unknown to the local authorities, his bond was sent back to Union county, where it will be approved by Circuit Judge Knowles and returned here.

fic in the matter" said County Prosecutor Hodgkin in speaking of the affair. "I shall certainly prosecute if such cases as come before me from that, or any other source, it matters not what the opinions of individual officials may be, the law should be enforced irrespective of that. The city has been without a segregated district for over a year, being eliminated and eradicated by Mayor M. K. Hall and so far as the county prosecutor's office is concerned, it will continue to be so as long as I occupy that office," concluded Mr. Hodgkin.

"No, we will not allow the line to reform," declared City Manager Lark in expressing his opinion on the current reports. "We are, indeed, sorely pressed to control vice and immorality in its present form in this city, but the public opinion is adverse to a restricted district, and the police department will exert itself to keep the vice situation under control so far as possible. I do not mean, when I say that there will no restricted district that the vice problem is

solved; far from it. The vice question in La Grande and every other city that has no restricted district, has to be met just the same, 'line' or no 'line.' We are handicapped at present by lack of co-operation, timely co-operation. The public will find the police department anxious and alert to follow up a clew of immorality, but the police can't watch everywhere that needs watching. A tip to the police force when there is yet time to get tangible evidence, is the greatest stride toward eradicating vice. We hear of it in the residence district, in hotels, rooming houses, there and everywhere, but usually long after the principals have moved to new quarters. This question is seldom to be found in one spot for any length of time. It moves, and efficacious information must be timely—on the spot. Informants need not be dragged in as witnesses if the police can be notified in time so that the police can land the evidence themselves. If the informant brings in the news, and has the evidence in his possession a day or two, or a week or two after the incident is closed, means either the informant must testify or the information is useless. It is along these lines that we ask for assistance from the public; to keep the line, as it is called, from assuming tangible formation, will be our duty, but to eradicate sporadic outbreaks of immorality is beyond this police department—or any other—if those who live in the vicinity of suspicious quarters do not tip us off to suspected wrong.

"On the other hand, no greater injustice could be done than to bring suspicion on an innocent party. Therefore it is indeed necessary that caution be exercised by individuals in reporting such suspected cases." It is in the face of these assertions it is not likely that "The line" will make any tangible effort to re-establish in La Grande right away.
