SINNOT FIGHTS FOR BOX BILL

UNDERWOOD DELIBERATELY DEFEATED MEASURE.

Congressman Sinnott Lambasts Those Who Killed Box Bill.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 21.—(Special)—In a short but very spicy ten minute speech Congressman Sinnott of Oregon this afternoon toasted and roasted Chairman Ashbrook of the Committee of Coinage Weights and Measures and Majority Leader Oscar Underwood, whom he accused of "chloroforming" the applabox bill in which the growers, granges and commission men of the west are interested by means of "parliamentary jugglery" at fifteen minutes before quitting time of the House of Representatives yesterday evening.

His speech made a decided hit, especially when he stated that had Eve in the Garden of Eden had a Hood River apple to taste of she would have lost all desire for the forbidden fruit. He warned his colleagues that the barrel bill which Western members had just passed before the box bill was sidetracked, had not yet reached the Senate.

Following is the substance of his speech:

"The passage of this bill was particularly desired by those interested in the apple industry in the West and

Northwest. It has received practically the unanimous approval of all branches of the apple trade and industry which uses the box instead of the barrel; it has been proved by representatives of fruit growers, fruit jobbers, horticultural societies, boards of trade, granges, commission merchants, apple shippers, and exporters from all parts of the United States, but more especially from such bodies in the Western half of the United States. The defeat of this bill may be another example of the team work we lately hear extolled so much, for sitting alongside of Chairman Ashbrook was Majority Leader Underwood, instigating the motion to adjourn Mr Underwood plumes himself before his constituents in senatorial campaigns with free cotton ties and bagging. He doubtless saw no campaign habiliments or material for Alabama in the apple box.

This bill was largely drafted by Charles E Whisler of Medford, Oregon. Its suppression will be a great disappointment to my constituents, who feel that the bill was at least entitled to the consideration of this House.

I represent the famous Hood River apple section of Oregon. It is the "Oregon apple" which has made famous in European countries our export apple trade, and it is the Hood River apple which has made famous the Oregon apple.

Mr Chairman, had the Hood River apple grown in the Garden of Eden man would not have fallen, for one bite, one taste of its lusciousness would have made Eve forget all about the forbidden fruit, and caused her

to cease longing for that proscribed article of diet. (Applause).

The interest of Hood River county alone in this bill may be seen when I tell you that last year there was shipped from this one Oregon county 1,500 cars of apples. Over 1,000,000 boxes were used in the trade in this county alone.

Mr. Chairman I desire to protest most vigorously against the sidetracking of this bill yesterday.

"They that have done this deed are honorable, What private griefs they have; alas: I know not,

That made them do it; they are wise and honorable And will no doubt with reasons answer you."

I have just one word to say by way of admonition and not by way of threat. It's this, that the apple barrel bill which we Western members helped to pass in the House yesterday has not yet passed the Senate." (Applause).

Correll Appeals to Legislators.

Salem, Jan. 20.—The Eastern Oregon delegation in the legislature want the tax law changed, according to a meeting of the members today. They favor the bill of Barrett, the intention of which is to remedy the faults in the law in force, although exceptions made by the members to the provisions made by the members to the provisions for the interest penalty which Barrett sets at 8 per cent for non-payment of the first half of the tax. They regard the tax amendment of Senator Smith favorably, although nothing definite was done in the matter. Smith would bring the assessment and collection in one year. The assessor would begin on January 1 and the complete roll would be done by the second Monday in June. Forbes reported the coyote bounty bill, now in committee, would probably be given to the house with a provision of \$3 per head.

S. O. Correll of Baker urged the delegation to support Senator Strayer's bill to enact a uniform branding law on the ground that it would stop rustling and result in a brand inspector for each county.

The legislators' clerks and stenographers total 155, within two of the number employed in the session of 1913, and not all the help secured yet. The former roll will be exceeded and the economy plan—in this respect fruitless.

The reorganization of the state raval militia upon a more efficient basis and a reduction in the appropriation allowed for its maintenance is recommended by the majority report of the military affairs committee of the senate.

The senate is to appoint a committee to investigate the Eastern Oregon asylum.

Fifteen School Boys Arrested. Baker, Jan. 21.—Constable Claude Bowman was as busy as a boy killing snakes yesterday afternoon arresting high school boys, charged with assault and battery on warrants issued in justice court. The arrests were the result of investigation by District Attorney Godwin of the "kangaroo court" at the Y. M. C. The Y. M. C. A. authorities appointed a committee to investigate the affair day before yesterday. W. H. Halliday, one of the committee, when questioned by a representative of the Democrat, said "There is nothing to it." The district attorney

evidently thinks there is something to it, and states that investigation has revealed the fact that the practice has been going on for some time at the "Y." He takes the responsibility for the arrests, saying that Mr. Jasper did not desire to prosecute and that the Y. M. C. A. officials had made no complaint.

The boys appeared before Justice of the Peace Hubbard yesterday afternoon, all entering pleas of guilty. They will meet the district attorney in justice court at 9 o'clock this morning and further hearing is set for 9:30.
