

HIGH SCHOOL TRIP CERTAIN

SPEED MERCHANTS WILL TAKE 3-GAME TRIP.

Wallowa Will be Hardest Nut of All to Crack—Basketball Notes.

Pendleton, Jan. 22.—Pendleton high took the steam out of the Union high school championship sails last night by winning 30 to 12. The Union team went to Milton today.

Next Thursday morning Coach Olson will bundle his speedy basketball heavers aboard the Joseph branch and invade Wallowa county from three different angles. If the dope sheet has the situation in hand with exactness, the high school five will run across its hardest fight on the trip at Wallowa Thursday night. Wallowa high not only has a good team but has had ample opportunity to get good practice on the new gymnasium floor. Wallowa defeated Joseph high by a bigger score than La Grande did, although Joseph players say they were decidedly off color at Wallowa and were at their best while here. Enterprise and Joseph should not tax La Grande much.

Just what the Wallowa five will do however, is another matter and the team will no doubt enter the town with considerable misgiving of what the outcome will be.

"In a basketball way the sun rises and sets at Union these days" seriously soliloquizes Manager Larson of the M. I. A. whenever his mind runs toward the games to be played at Union next Monday evening and for which an excursion on a special train will be run Monday evening leaving here at 6:45. The boys from here will meet the Union Athletic club and the local girls will meet the Union girls. "We admit that this is going to be the game of the winter for us," said Mr. Larson today. Other members of the team substantiate the claim.

Because the high school is leaving on a hard tour next Thursday, some question arises about their ability to play the Clerks in the league schedule next Wednesday evening. Some suitable disposition will be made of the matter by the league directors within a day or two no doubt.

Pendleton sportsmen have not given up hope of retaining the license fees within a special fund and thus avoiding the likelihood and danger of having the fish and game department of the state cut off at the pocket by some over-zealous legislature in the future. Listen to this from the Pendleton East Oregonian:

"Resolved, that we, the citizens of Umatilla county in mass meeting assembled, recommend to the Oregon legislature that no change be made in the law affecting the game protection fund of the state game commission."

"This was the resolution unanimously adopted last evening at a mass meeting of sportsmen and taxpayers held in the Commercial club rooms and presided over by G. I. Ladow as chairman and R. W. Fletcher as secretary. A copy of the resolutions was sent to each member of the Umatilla county delegation.

"This is the biggest protest against

the Schuebel bill yet sent in from this county and follows remonstrances forwarded by the Umatilla Fish & Game association, the Round-up Gun club, the board of managers of the Commercial association and bodies of sportsmen of Athena and Pilot Rock."

Walla Walla, Jan. 21.—Walla Walla defeated Pendleton in the first series of bowling match games, on Pastime allies last night, by a margin of 59 pins, the final score being Walla Walla 2424; Pendleton 2365. The local team won the first two games and lost the last one by 100 pins. The play was exciting all throughout and witnessed by a fair-sized crowd. Wheeler with Pendleton, made high score of 201 and Kremer of Walla Walla, high total of 527.

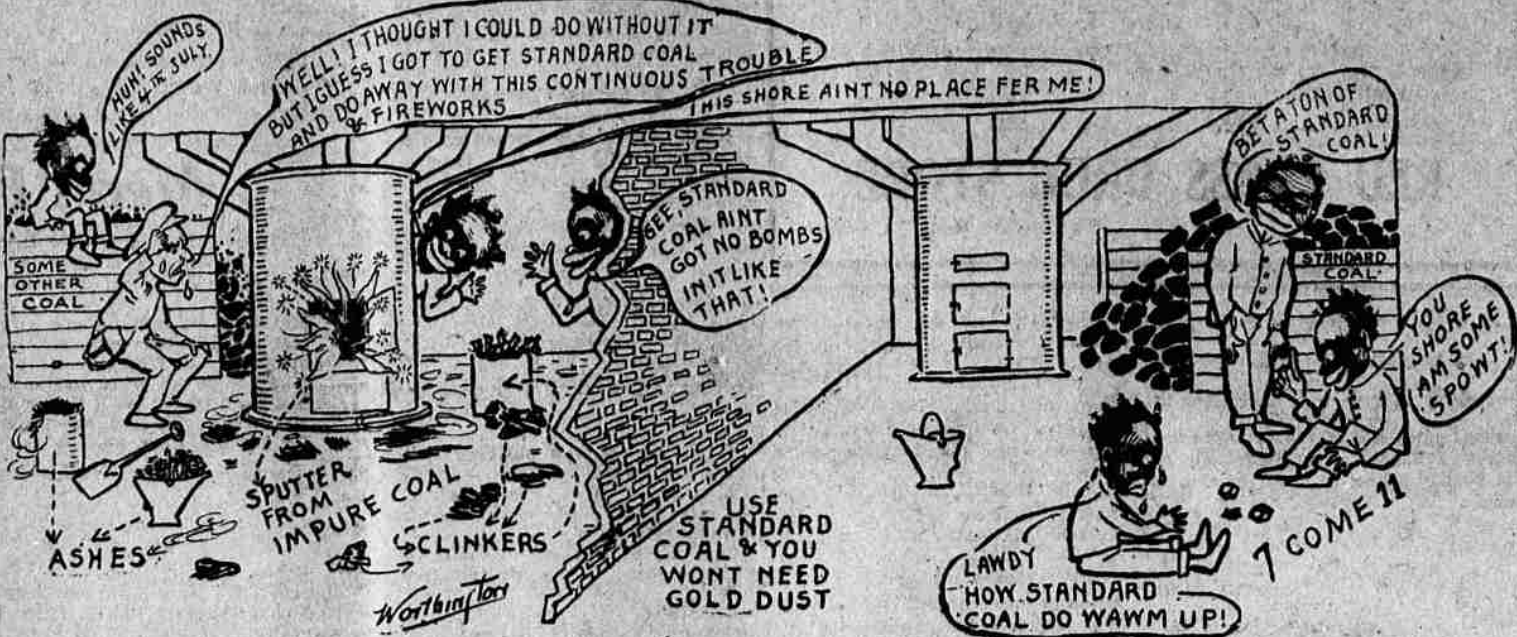
