Bank of Umatilla Dissolved.

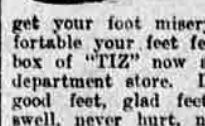
Pendleton, Jan. 27.—Because of the prospects of the removal of the O.-W. R. & N. division point from Umatilla and of the consequent decrease in business there, the First Bank of Umatilla, by a vote of the shareholders, has been dissolved. The liquidation will take place next Tuesday, January 28, according to W. L. Thompson, president of the Umatilla bank. Mr. Thompson states that during the time the bank has been maintained at Umatilla it has paid but that with all indications pointing to the removal of the railroad division point, conditions did not warrant maintaining it longer in the view of those financially interested in it.
