MINISTERS ELECT HEAD

RELIGIOUS CENSUS OF THE CITY TO BE TAKEN.

Year's Work Outlined and Officers Are Elected.

Permanent organization of the La Grande ministerial association took place yesterday afternoon. The meeting was held in the Y. M. C. A. and after a temporary organization had been perfected, with Rev. G. L. Clark as chairman and John H. Rudd as secretary, the permanent officers were elected, and resolutions covering the work immediately before the association was outlined. These endeavors include a religious census of the city, and endorsement of and co-operation with the systematic charities conducted by the Neighborhood club.

R. E. Close, pastor of the Baptist church, is president of the association, L. L. Myers of the Christian church is vice-president, and Rev. J. H. Lumber of the Methodist church South, is secretary-treasurer.

Reverend Lumber and Reverend Myers were named a committee to conduct the religious census, and this will be commenced as soon as the proper plans can be formulated.

The association heartily endorsed the plan of having the Neighborhood club conduct the charities of the city, and each church is going to work in conjunction with the club, Mrs. F. M. Jackson being chairman of the club committee assigned to the work.

ROLL CALL IS BIG SUCCESS

THREE HUNDRED PRESENT AT FUNCTION.

Musical Numbers Interspersed With Answers to Roll Call.

The commodious lodge room in the I. O. O. F. hall was not large enough to accommodate the crowds that assembled last night at the annual roll call of the Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges held in joint session. Conservative estimates place the attendance at 300 including not only the members of the two orders in this city and visiting members but the families of members as well.

The ceremonies opened with the singing of the opening ode of the order, followed by prayer by Geo. Ball Mose Elledge, Noble Grand of the Odd Fellow lodge and Miss Louise Douglass, Noble Grand of the Rebekah lodge presided. The formal opening ceremonies was followed by the reading of the names on the rosters of the two orders, the members responding either in person or by letter.

Following the roll call a number of excellent addresses on the teachings of Oddfellowship were given by H. E. Coolidge, Past Grand Master. He told of the work of the order as he has found it in his experience that has carried him to the highest office in the gift of the state. Mrs. Addie Grout, Past Grand Master of the Rebekah assembly told of some of

the reasons why she was a Rebekah. Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe responded to a call for a brief talk on "What the Lodge Means to Me." Frank Shannon, a visitor from Iowa, outlined briefly the work of the order in his state. Rev. A. J. Adams, formerly of this city but now pastor of the Federated church at Enterprise talked at some length on the place that Oddfellowship plays in the life's work. Miss Ollie Childers, whose membership in the Rebekah lodge is in Washington, favored the assemblage with a short talk and also responded to the roll call in behalf of her father who is seriously ill at his home in this city. Many other members of both orders responded with remarks appropriate to the occasion.

The addresses were followed by a musical program and literary program consisting of a vocal solo by Mary Fitzgerald, a reading by Margaret Baker, piano solo by Ruth Fitzgerald, vocal duet by Mr. and Mrs. Robertson, of Island City, and a vocal solo by Miss Maude Goodwin of Oakland, California. The fact that each of these numbers called for response attests to the success of this part of the evening's program.

By the time the banquet was in order a number of those in attendance at the first part of the program had left for their homes but even at that nearly 200 plates were served at the three tables that filled the banquet room.

Both the Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges of this city are in splendid condition, the Odd Fellows numbering some 125 members with additional applications awaiting admission. The Rebekahs, who are hardly so numerous as the Odd Fellows, are, however recognized as one of the strongest auxiliary organizations in the city and have proven themselves an important factor in the social life of the city.
