JONES' MOVE IS FRUSTRATED

ATTACK ON FINLEY'S FILMS MEETS REBUFF.

Al Jones, West and Evans Said to Be in Cahoots.

The following Salem story was published in a Portland paper Friday: Salem, Or., Jan.—Revengeful politics upon the part of ex-Governor West, the former game warden Evans and representative Jones, warm friends and political associates, is said to have prompted the introduction of a resolution in the house yesterday afternoon refusing game warden Finley the use of the House chamber to display educational films of wild animal life in Oregon.

Representative Jones, chairman of the game committee, introduced the resolution, and after it had been severely denounced by a number of members, the House emphatically voiced its disapproval of it by burying it beneath an avalanche of votes. The ousting of Evans as Game Warden a number of months ago, and the appointment of Finley to succeed him is said to be the reason for attacks upon Finley by West, Evans and Jones. The reputed plan of these three is to dispose of Finley by lending their aid to a reorganization of the game commission, and secondarily by discrediting his work, and the resolution yesterday afternoon is regarded as the first thrust in the latter direction.

Although the ex Governor is a Democrat and Jones and Evans are Republicans, they have always worked harmoniously in politics, it is stated. The explanation of this is said to exist in the friendship that exist between the three.

The resolution declared that the exhibition was to be given solely for the purpose of influencing the members of the legislature on legislation pertaining to game matters, and the absurdity as the well as the falsity of the charge became apparent when Representative Eaton on the floor of the House, declared that Finley was induced by his efforts to consent to giving the moving picture show.

"I saw the show in Portland, and I was so impressed with its educational value, that I asked Mr. Finley if he would not put it on during the season," said Eaton. "He finally consented, and upon learning this afternoon that there was opposition to it, wanted to abandon it. I told him, however, that the people had been led to expect that the pictures of wild animal life would be shown and that they must not be disappointed. There is absolutely no politics in it, and never was."

"I am not in sympathy with this resolution," said speaker (Selling). "Mr. Finley has been invited to give the show, and the discourtesy of declining him the use of the chamber ought not now to be shown him."

"The resolution is an insult to Mr. Finley, and every sportsman in Oregon," said Representative Littlefield. "I am amazed that anyone should make such a resolution."

"The resolution is an insult to Mr. Finley, and every sportsman in Oregon," said Representative Gill who declared that if any members were afraid of being influenced, that they could remain away as it was not compulsory on them to attend the show. Several other members expressed similar views. Representative Jones alone spoke in favor of the resolution. Representative Blanchard said he would vote for it, not because he regarded the scheme of a political character, but because he desired to work at his desk during the evening.
