Obituary.

The remains of Chrissy Noble Gollithon were brought home to La Grande on Wednesday, Jan. 27, and the funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. at the Bohnenkamp chapel. A large number of friends and acquaintances gathered to pay their last respects and take part in the funeral services over the remains of their dear departed friend, Christina Noble Gollithon, whose death occurred at San Diego, California Jan. 20th., where she went in hopes of recovering her health about six months ago. She had been ailing for the last three years or since her mother's death which was a great shock to her as she died suddenly when on her way to Portland. Chrissy had lived here since childhood and all who knew her had grown to love her for her kind and jovial disposition and open and business-like manner. Three years ago she suffered an attack of nervous prostration, secondary, a stroke of paralysis, which finally developed into valvular heart trouble from which she succumbed. The chapel was crowded with friends hoping to be permitted to view the remains, a number being unable to gain admittance. A very impressive service was conducted by the Rev. G. L. Clark of the First Presbyterian church with appropriate song service and a profusion of floral offerings.

Christina William Noble was born in Fraserburgh, Scotland, February 27, 1878 and moved with her parents Mary and William Noble to La Grande in 1888, living here ever since. She was married to Thomas N. Gollithon in 1903. To which union two children were born, Robert, deceased, and Jean of Portola, California. The other surviving relatives are two sisters and three brothers, Margaret, Louis, George and William of La Grande and Mrs. Elizabeth Stenberg of Ithica, N. Y.

Chrissy Gollithon was a woman of unusual business ability, honesty and integrity. She had been a member of the First Presbyterian church since fifteen years of age and her life was marked by many acts of kindness, generosity and self sacrifice and will be greatly missed and long remembered by a large circle of friends and relatives who will mourn the loss of a kind mother and sister and good Christian friend.

The remains were laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery, beside those of her father, mother, brother and little son, Robert.
