Fine Gold Achievement Pin Presented to Miss Gertrude Courtney.

ly the same testimony as Reggner, emphasizing the fact that they had been in the room no longer than 15 minutes when the officers arrived, and denying any unlawful relations or any knowledge of the reputation of the Oxford rooming house. The presence of the block system was accounted for by the fact that the occupants of the house used that kind of wood for fuel, and denied any knowledge of the use of such a system of signals.

The introduction into the evidence of proofs to show that John Smith was not an assumed name and the mention of "slurring insinuations" brought about a lively tilt between the counsel for the two sides which Municipal Judge Eakin had difficulty in quieting. Judge Eakin in explaining his finding in the case stated that while it had been shown that the Oxford rooming house bore a very unsavory reputation, the fact that four of the defendants were yet in their street clothes when arrested and that the women still wore their wraps, and the other two women were found in bed asleep could hardly be considered as evidence that the house was being used for immoral purposes at that time.

Another night session tonight will take up the case of the parties caught in the drag net at the Blue Mountain House. The night sessions of the court this week are due to the session of circuit court which has been demanding the attention of some of the attorneys in the case at all times and has made it necessary to either hold a night session or hold the cases over until circuit court adjourns.
