WEATHER FORECASTS.

Method of Tracing the Direction and Speed of Storms.

Most of the severe storms do not originate in the United States. They come to us from the Philippines, Japan, Siberia, Alaska, Canada or the Gulf of Mexico. Our weather bureau gets cable, telegraphic or wireless notice of a foreign storm. Station after station of the weather bureau and vessel report its arrival, so that the general direction and the speed with which it travels can be very nearly determined. Some storms can be foretold as much as ten days in advance of their arrival at a given point.

When a storm from Siberia drifts eastward around the north pole and reappears in Alaska the speed with which it has covered that section of its course is made the basis of the calculation of the time when it should appear in Washington and Oregon, when it should get to the great lakes and finally to the Atlantic coast, and each section is warned in advance. Unexpected conditions may delay the storms or divert them from the course. Tabs are kept on the cold waves in much the same manner. The weather reports from Canada, Iceland, Europe, Russia and Siberia are studied and predictions made as to when the cold waves from these countries will reach the United States.

HEART STRAIN.

Unusual Exertion May Cause It, and So May a Fit of Temper.

To keep your temper is rather a good idea, said Dr. Strickland Goodall in a lecture at the Institute of Hygiene. Every time the heart contracts, he said, its force would raise a weight of two pounds to the height of one foot, and it does this from 70 to 140 times every minute.

Acute heart strain was difficult to produce in a young, well nourished and healthy adult, but it was very easy to produce if the heart muscle was anemic or poisoned or was the seat of degenerative disease.

Running to catch a train increased the heart's work by 228 foot pounds a minute. Ascending a staircase slowly increased the heart's work by 112 foot pounds; ascending quickly by 152 foot pounds.

The enormous amount of total extra work done by the heart was shown in the experiment of riding a bicycle up hill, the gradient of which was one in ten and the length 2,904 feet. The ride occupied three and one-half minutes, and the total extra work done by the heart was no less than one and one-eighth foot tons.

A rest of half an hour daily would save in a year 219,000 foot pounds of work on the heart.—London Chronicle.

INCENDIARY AT LOSTINE.

Second Disastrous Fire in Year Makes Citizens Suspicious.

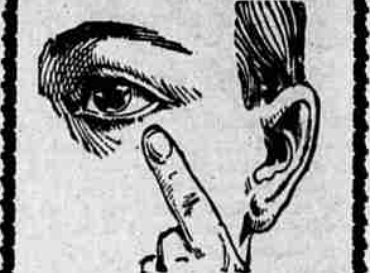
Lostine suffered the second disastrous fire within a year when Bright's hall was totally destroyed early Monday morning, says the Enterprise Record Chief. Hamilton hall burned last April.

The Bright fire originated in the second story and owing to the dry timbers quickly gained great headway. Within a few minutes it broke through the roof and made a glare that was seen for miles. A large crowd gathered but owing to the intense heat were not able to get very close to the burning building. As there was no wiring in the second floor the owner, J. W. Bright, as well as other Lostine citizens, feel certain the work is due to incendiarism. Investigations are being made in this respect.

Mr. Bright estimates his loss at \$3000, with no insurance.

Since the two public halls are now things of the past entertainments and public gatherings will be confined to the school house, and perhaps the lodge rooms. It is thought by spring a move will be made by the citizens to have a modern hall built, which will be an enterprise worth considering.
