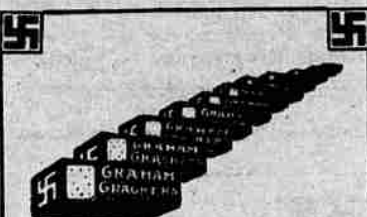

WHEAT ADVANCE EFFECTS ALL FOODS MADE FROM WHEAT.

Even macaroni has gone up and another boost is anticipated for the near future. This stuff is composed entirely of flour and water, but flour comes from wheat, and there you are.

It is said by those in a position to know that there is not a single thing in food lines even remotely related to wheat but what will or has gone up since the wheat market started its long, high balloon trip. The market is excited and will continue so for some time to come.

Sugar also seems to have taken a course which has no turning—at least none that is as yet discernable. The raise of yesterday in which ten cents was tacked onto the price was followed today by a similar raise, and the market is still strong with the next move very doubtful but inclined upward.
