They have lined up several fast young players for the Baker team, they report, and believe that Baker can be a pennant contender.

Both Mr. Clifford and Louis Fernald, secretary of the 1914 team, are willing to aid in backing a team again this year. Both favor a lower salary limit next year and think that as good a grade of ball can be furnished

CAR VICTIM'S KIN RICH

One of Men Found Suffocated at Durkee Albert Corbin, of Buxton.

Baker, Ore., Feb. 5.—Letters found in the pocket of one of the three men found dead in a refrigerator car at Durkee yesterday show that he is Albert Corbin, of Buxton, Ore., a brother of Elmer Corbin, connected with the Federal banking department at Washington. From the tone of the letter it is apparent that the brother is a man of wealth. He speaks of maintaining two houses at Washington and of elaborate social entertainments given by his family. There was also a letter from a sister, Eva, at Plalno, Ill. That Corbin had been living at Buxton, Ore., was evidenced by a letter from his wife begging him to return to her and saying that if he did not she would go to her home in the East.

Corbin, like the other two men, was roughly dressed. The other two were identified as J. C. Johnson and Byron Johnson, father and son, of Caldwell, Idaho. They have been working at Umatilla, where they boarded the refrigerator car Tuesday night with Ray Richie, who was told there was no room in the car for him. He traveled in an unheated car and saved his life. The inquest was held at 1 a. m. today at Huntington.

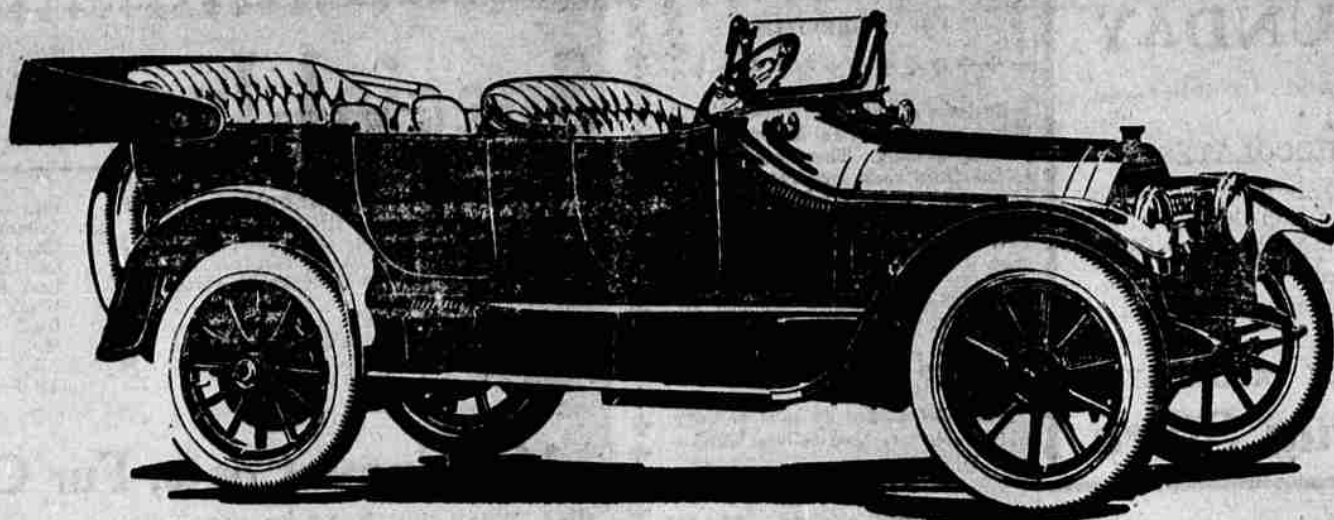
