

PLANTS AIMED AT NEW BILLS

TEACHERS OPPOSED TO ALL BUT ONE MEASURE.

Very Successful Meeting of Superintendents Comes to Close.

Voicing their sentiments on proposed legislation affecting school work, approving such measures as, to their minds, would benefit the school system and disapproving other measures which they believed would prove a detriment to the work, the school superintendents of Eastern Oregon closed a most interesting session in this city late Saturday evening.

One of the bills which came under the disapproving eye of the educators was House Bill No. 243 which provides for a change in the present certificate law. It was intimated that the bill was born in a spirit of revenge and spite work and would work great harm upon the present school system.

Senate Bill No. 67 providing for a change in the present school district plan was denounced as visionary and ineffectual. This is the bill which would abolish all district organizations now in force and create instead a system of five districts in each county. Each of these districts would be represented upon the county board of education by one member of all of the affairs pertaining to the schools in the county would be controlled by this board, even to the employment of the county superintendent and the teachers for the various schools in the county.

in the present tuition laws and abolishing the present appropriation system which makes of every high school in the county virtually a county high school and under which system Union county is operating, was also opposed.

The only bit of legislation to receive the approval of the educators was a clause in Senate Bill No. 85 which provides that teachers' examinations shall be held one month later in the year than at present. This bill provides that the examinations shall be held in August and February of each year.

Unanimous and hearty approval was given to the school fair work and a resolution was presented and quickly adopted urging that funds be provided for the maintenance of this work as well as the work of the Oregon Social Hygiene Society.

The afternoon's session took up the consideration of those subjects on the program which were not reached during the morning. "Inter-scholastic Rhetorical Contests and Debates," was discussed at length by H. H. Heuston of the Elgin school, and Chas. E. Oisan, of the La Grande schools.

Roy Conklin, of Wallowa and Royal Allen, of Cove, both of whom have had considerable experience in the work of school affairs, set out at length the value of this work in connection with the schools.

"The School as a Social Center," was heartily endorsed by Superintendent Girdler of this city, the plan, according to Mr. Girdler's idea being most generally advisable in those communities wherein the advantage of other social centers are not enjoyed.

The problem of inducing the teacher to call at the home of the pupil in an effort to secure a closer relationship and a better understanding between these two factors in the school work was ably discussed by J. A. Briggs of the North Powder schools and Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, county superintendent of schools of Union county.
