Big Land Deed Closed.

Pendleton, Feb. 8.—Through a deal completed here today James Sturgis and Guy Wyrick have purchased the Davis-Harala ranch, several miles northwest of Pendleton for a consideration given at \$23,000. The ranch contains 686 acres and is located a mile and a half west of the C. J. Smith ranch now being farmed by Sturgis & Wyrick.

The new owners of the land will farm the Davis-Harala ranch in conjunction with the land they already have and the deal gives them a total of over 3000 acres of wheat land, 1800 acres of which will be in wheat this season. They are going on the assumption that with the high price prevailing for wheat it is good business to farm as extensively as possible. It is said they were offered a bonus of \$2000 for their bargain today but declined to take it. Three-fourths of the ranch was owned by Samuel Davis and one-fourth by Arthur Harala.

Umatilla County will Assist.

Pendleton, Feb. 8.—By action of the county court Umatilla county has agreed to cooperate with other counties of Eastern Oregon in keeping a man at the Eastern Oregon exhibit at San Francisco during the time allotted to this county. This will be from April 15 to June 15 and from October 15 to December 4. The court has not yet selected a man for the place but there is at least one candidate in the person of C. K. Cranston, secretary of the Pendleton Commercial club.

As planned at the meeting held at Baker Wednesday, a Wheat Cascade will be one of the features of the Eastern Oregon display. The details of the scheme have not yet been worked out but it is believed a creditable exhibit illustrating in a novel way the big resources of Eastern Oregon can be provided.
