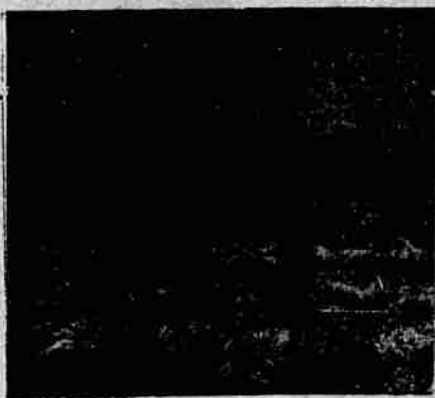

GIRL WILL TRAIN HORSES

Umatilla County Woman Has Ability Equaled By but Few.

Pendleton, Feb. 9.—Instead of being driven from Pendleton and Umatilla county by the notoriety which she gained as one of the principal figures in the Burke murder trial last week, Billie Clifford announced this morning that she intends making Umatilla county her permanent home and horse training her means of livelihood. She will leave Wednesday for Boise but expects to return within two or three weeks.

She has already received a number of offers to train horses for wild west shows, she says, and will engage in this line of business upon her return. She will also attend a number of the shows this fall as a trick and fancy rider. Mrs. Clifford's specialty is standing Roman riding but she is an all-round horsewoman. In fact, it is said that there are few women in these parts who can manage a horse better than she can. She has attended the past two Round-ups as well as quite a number of smaller wild west shows and for a period of three months traveled with the Barney Sherry outfit all over the west. It was while traveling with this outfit and at subsequent wild west shows that she got to know young Richard Burke so well.

RECEIPTS GOOD; MARKET IS FIRM

STEERS AND HOGS HOLDING ON,
WITH SHEEP DOWN.

Sales Not Up to Past Records but
Quality Improved.

Sugar Up 25 Cents.

Sugar quotations were boosted 25 cents this morning, bringing the retail price up to \$7.00 for cash and \$7.40 for 30 days time.

Union Stockyards, Portland, Feb. 8.—Steadiness featured the livestock market today with the exception of sheep, which showed added strength, ewes gaining a dime with the sale of two lots at \$6. Prime steers brought \$8 and hogs \$7.35, the same prices as in effect Saturday. Bulls went up to 6 cents and stags to 6 1/2.

Receipts were heavy, consisting of 8234 head in all. This is not up to past records, but taking into consideration the improved quality of the stuff coming in, together with the slightly better demand, it was just as well that receipts were not larger. There was some stuff left over from Saturday.

The sales were good. Before noon more than 1000 head had been disposed of. The principal call was for hogs, with over 500 of them selling in less than an hour.

Receipts consisted of 1428 cattle, two calves, 2809 hogs and 2995 sheep—a total of 105 cars.
