BRIDGE BLOWN UP BY HORN, BEFORE EXPLOSION



This is the Canadian Pacific bridge over the St. Croix at Vanceboro, Me., which was partly blown up by the German who gave his name as Werner von Horn, and said he was an officer of the German army. The bridge formed the most important link between Canada and the British Isles. It was on the short route of the Canadian Pacific to New Brunswick, where shipments of soldiers, ammunition and supplies for the war have been made.

The prisoner, a powerfully built German six feet two inches tall, weighing about 190 pounds, is undeniably German and gives every appearance of having had military training. According to the authorities he makes no attempt to conceal the fact that at midnight, Monday, Feb. 1, he placed a large charge of nitroglycerine near the Canadian end of the bridge, and exploded it in the hope of cutting off the long procession of grain trains, general food trains, troop trains, and horse trains forwarded from northern and eastern Canada to St. John, N. B., for shipment to the British armies abroad. He proudly exhibits a German flag which was wrapped around his left arm when he was captured.

Pendleton, Feb. 9.—Beginning tomorrow morning the Indian congregation of the Tutuilla church will hold its annual evangelistic campmeeting, and already there are a large number of the red people camped about the church in anticipation of the services. A large number of Indians from other reservations will be present to attend and assist in the meetings.

Among the visitors will be Rev. James Hays, the noted Indian evangelist of Kamiah, Idaho, Rev. Moses Monteith, pastor of the second church at Kamiah, and Rev. William Wheeler of Achahka, Idaho and formerly pastor at Tutuilla. They will all assist in conducting the services. Rev. J. M. Cornelson, missionary at Tutuilla, intended to conduct the services but the injuries he received yesterday in a runaway may prevent him from attending at first. The campmeeting will continue through Wednesday, February 17. White people as well as red will be welcomed.
