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WHITE CROSS UNDER FIRE

FOUNDER OF GIRLS' HOME CRITICIZED.

Philanthropist Describes How He Feeds Homeless Girls.

New York, Feb. 15.—The Utopian dream of social workers and sociological experts—an organization that really extends charity without investigations and inquisitorial subjections of its beneficiaries—is Franklyn Lawrence's statement of the aims and purposes of the White Cross committee.

But Lawrence prefers to help pretty girls—the prettier the better—and his motives have been questioned, leaving him in hot water up to his neck. But Lawrence is confident of paddling out and convincing a somewhat incredulous public that the White Cross home—a brownstone structure in West Fifty-first street, is just what he terms it to be, a refuge for those who most need help.

The White Cross committee has been plastered all over the first pages of New York newspapers because Mrs. John Purroy Mitchell, wife of the mayor, requested that her name be withdrawn from the committee's list of patronesses and intimates that Lawrence had no right to use it in the first place.

Half a dozen other society patronesses whose names appeared on the letterheads of the committee have denied they gave permission, and Lawrence now says he has to bar pretty girls from the house.

But as for Lawrence—here's his view of the subject:

At the modest brownstone house on West Fifty-first street a young girl may secure food and lodging if she is in need without subjecting herself to an examination. She doesn't even have to give her name unless she so desires. When she finds employment she leaves the house to make room for the next unfortunate. The place is particularly for young and preferably beautiful girls. It is designed especially to save girls from the streets and brothels.

To be beautiful and young in New York is to be in danger—to a certain degree. Age is its own best protector. And elderly woman is comparatively safe; a young one isn't. That is the theory upon which the house is founded. Nightly it is caring for girls out of work, well dressed they are, and for the most part good to look upon.

They are factory workers and mill toilers. They are professional people, actresses perchance, maybe stenographers or clerks, who in any but periods of economic disease would go down Broadway with their heads in the air—good examples of the independent American working girl.

Take from a woman her friends, her money, starve her, beat her, but her spirit remains. Take from her her clothes and objects of personal adornment and you've broken her spirit and her pride. Then it is that women fall, according to the arguments advanced by Lawrence and Mrs. Louise L. Cobb, who are managing the place.

So the house wants its "guests" to keep their fine clothes—keep their front and their good looks. Then when they get back on their feet, to remember that there are others in the same circumstances they once were.

"Organized charity" has attacked the place because it makes no attempt to secure work for its beneficiaries. Also, because it makes no investigations as to the worthiness of them. But the sponsors for the brownstone house on Fifty-first street advance the theory that women are going wrong and committing suicide while they are being "investigated." Feed first above all things, they say, for a full stomach knows a conscience where an empty one is heartless.

The place at present is kept up mostly by donations and subscriptions, but it is the hope of its founders that ultimately the people who have flocked at its board will remember there are others unfortunate and keep it up themselves.

Rent of the house is free, that cuts a considerable figure. A philanthropic millionaire donated the house and many of the leading hotels have sent and continue to send not only eatables but equipment, such as dishes, furniture and drapings which are beginning to show the ravages of time.

Of course, there are no banquets of expensive foods and wines. The food is of the plainest, but its clean and wholesome. Then, too, if the guests don't like it they need not stay. They come and go as they please with no "matron" to see that the lights are out at a certain time. Everything is free, democratic—and fascinating. Your next door neighbor may be a famous prima donna who is temporarily in financial difficulties for all you know. Then, again, she may be Flossie, the beautiful gum-chewing—but eminently respectable—stenographer.

CLEVELAND AMBITIOUS

WANTS TO BECOME A SEAPORT THOUGH INLAND.

Has Scheme to Connect Great Lakes With the Gulf.

Cleveland, Feb. 15.—Commercial and shipping interest in Cleveland, Toledo, and Cincinnati are in co-operation today in a \$27,000,000 plan to construct a lake to the gulf deep waterway that will make Cincinnati an "inland seaport" and enable Great Lakes vessels to cruise to New Orleans and the Pacific via the Panama canal.

Deepening of the Erie-Miami canal from Lake Erie to the Ohio river is the project. This, it is pointed out by the backers, will also afford flood drainage protection for those sections of Ohio endangered annually by spring floods and serve the double purpose of providing an all water outlet southward for the vast commercial products of the Central West. The ship canal project will be put before the Ohio legislature as a substitute for several flood prevention measures now pending before that body.

State and eventually national funds will be asked to make the inland waterway possible within the next three years. Advocates of the plan say that it will prove an economical solution of Ohio's flood situation and at the same time throw to the Great Lakes ports the Panama canal business that Pittsburgh and other cities are seeking. Estimates for adequate flood protection are in of the amount necessary for the ship canal, it is claimed.

Twice during the past fifteen years the project has been surveyed by engineers and found practicable.
