NEW BUILDING FUND ATTACKED

PENDLETON AND THE DALLES
ALARMED

Grasshopper Dozer Now Ready for
Distribution

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10, 1915.—(Special)—Eastern Oregon came near losing the appropriations for its public buildings at The Dalles and Pendleton a day or two ago on account of the motion of Representative Gillette of Massachusetts to cut out all appropriations in the Civil Sundry Bill for new public buildings. While the plans for both of these buildings have been completed and the sites secured actual construction has not yet started. The Sundry Civil Bill carried an appropriation of \$73,000 towards work on the Pendleton building and \$60,000 for The Dalles building. Congressman Sinnott kept close watch through the hours when this part of the bill was under consideration and was among those who voted down Representative Gillette's amendment. There is still some chance that the Department of Agriculture may plant trees as a windbreak within the West Umatilla extension project. Representative Sinnott took the matter up with Director Davis of the Reclamation Service but was informed that that department had no funds that could be used for such a purpose. The Department of Agriculture has a fund but it is short at the present time, and that department feared that there would not be enough to care for the Oregon project. At Mr. Sinnott's department request however, the matter will be reconsidered and the department will make an effort to figure the Umatilla planting project within the money it has for this purpose.

the enforcement of its provisions will be passed, as will render it less difficult to get results in the future than has been the rule in the past. The Salem solons seem to grapple with the philosophy and underlying principles that should always guide practical law-givers. The evil to be overcome is universally admitted, and the difficulty in combatting it is verified by the experience of ages. The people have spoken, and ask their representatives to enact a law that will secure results. Such a law along right lines can be practically and satisfactorily enforced; and the law proposed seems to have every merit that would justify the hopes of its most sanguine advocates.

"Of course, as usual, there are some freak and fad bills pending that will 'die a bornin'." This cannot be helped, and the general assembly is no more responsible for their introduction, than a church is responsible for the hypocrisy of a member. It

would be a useless and futile task to point out faults and remedies for all the ills growing out of laws loosely enacted, or difficult to adequately enforce, without trenching upon the individual right to a full and fair hearing. The present legislature to my mind, is proceeding along right lines, and doing the very best it can. It should be aided with timely and sane suggestions, and not hampered, or intimidated by criticisms or threats. I am confident the present legislature of this state will open the way for reforms in the future that will make it possible to enforce all laws that when a judgment is once found upon a trial of the facts, the case will be a closed incident, and the dream of certain and speedy justice, will blossom and ripen into a waking reality. Then the law will be loyally observed and supported by the law-abiding and wholesomely feared and more generally obeyed by the lawless."

CONTRACTOR SUES SCHOOL

G. H. RUSH ALLEGES MONEY IS
DUE HIM.

Union School District is Defendant in
Collection Suit.

G. H. Rush, contractor and builder, of this city, is in Circuit court today attempting to collect a sum of money amounting to \$2,000 with interest on the same from September 1911, alleged to be due him from the Union school district, No. 5, for work performed at that time.

Mr. Rush was awarded the contract for the construction of the magnificent high school building at Union in 1911, the second largest building of its kind in the county—size of city considered. According to his contentions the original specifications called for only one and a half feet of excavation for the foundation. Arriving at this depth it was found that the foundation if put in there, would rest on only black soil. It was then decided to be necessary to go down deep enough to find a more solid base for the foundation, this requiring excavating to a depth of nine feet and eight inches, Mr. Rush claiming that the amount of money sued for at this time is for the extra work and is justly due him, which contention the school board of the district deny.

Crawford & Eakin represent Mr. Rush in the case, with J. D. Slater of this city and R. J. Kitchen of Union defending the school district.

FOLEY RESIDENCE DAMAGED

SIX HUNDRED DOLLAR LOSS IS
SUSTAINED.

Tenacious Blaze Keeps Department
on the Jump Sunday.

A fire that for a time threatened to gut the J. E. Foley residence on Fourth street Sunday morning kept the fire department jumping side-wise. While the precise cause is not known, it is believed a defective flue started the blaze, located in the attic of the house. The department was brought to the scene when the fire was discovered but it took considerable effort to conquer the blaze. Holes were cut through the roof and the small quantity of water used did considerable damage to the parlor, but otherwise harm is confined principally to the structure proper. Chemicals were largely used. Mr. Foley places the loss at about \$600 which is partially insured.
