SLUMP COMES AND FIRMNESS MISSING.

Limited Supply of Home Grown Celery on the Market.

Following a steadily weakening market, quotations on strictly fresh ranch eggs dropped this morning to 30 cents, and even at this the market shows no sign of firmness. The local supply of ranch eggs continues to hold up to the demand for the product.

A limited supply of home grown celery has again made its appearance on the market. The appearance of the product does not compare very favorably with the imported celery but the quality and flavor is said to be far superior. The home grown product is quoted at 5 cents a bunch.

a new member would get a place on this committee. Congressman Sinnott is now on Public Lands and Irrigation of Arid Lands and feels that these committees afford him an opportunity for doing particular service to his state. He is regarded as an authority on matters of land law and irrigation law and would probably be reluctant to leave these committees even for the promotion to Interstate and Foreign Commerce, although many things of interest to Oregon are brought before this committee.

Oregon Senators Change Little. There will probably be little change in committee assignments for Oregon Senators. Senator Chamberlain will doubtless wish to retain chairmanship of Military Affairs committee, and remain on Agriculture, Appropriations, Commerce, Public Lands and Territories. Senator Lane is chairman of Forest Reservations and the Protection of Game. This committee is one of those minor committees given to new Senators of the majority party chiefly to enable them to have more and better paid clerks than would otherwise be allowed them. It is probable that as the list of his other committees of which he is a member is big, he will retain this chairmanship during the next congress. He is within one of being ranking member of the Committee on Expenditures in the Post Office Department, but Blair Lee of Maryland will be a member of the next Congress so he stands between the Oregon man and this chairmanship. He is quite an active member on Indian Affairs committee but is only in fourth place thereon, which makes it improbable he would be advanced to the chairmanship of the same during the sixty-fourth congress.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10, 1915.—(Special)—Abel Ady, president of the Klamath Water Users association who has been here some time looking after matters of interest to the settlers in Southern Oregon feels that he has arranged a tentative adjustment with the land department in regard to the matter of settlers on the contemplated bird reserve on the Lower Klamath which promises to bring that problem to a satisfactory conclusion. The plan is not yet worked out in detail but is an arrangement by which those in the reserve who have equities make exchange their selections for others without the proposed reserve. Mr. Ady intends to take the matter up with the settlers interested immediately upon his return to Oregon. He expects to leave here about February 12th.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10, 1915.—(Special)—Did you ever hear of a "hopperdozer"? It is a contrivance made of sheet iron to hold kerosene and water and drag across a field infested with grasshoppers. It is described in full in Bulletin No. 637, issued by the Department of Agriculture a day or two since, entitled "The Grasshopper Problem and Alfalfa Culture."
