REHEARING SOUGHT

District Attorneyship May Come Up Once More.

That the question involved in the district attorneyship in Union county is not yet definitely settled was made known today by J. D. Slater, attorney for Jno. S. Hodgins in this case which involves the right to the office as between Mr. Hodgins, Governor West's appointee to the position, and F. S. Ivanhoe, incumbent at the time the appointment was made. A decision handed down by the supreme court February 9th, declared that Mr. Ivanhoe's term of office did not expire until January 1, 1917, but Mr. Slater is now preparing a petition for a rehearing of the case, which will be presented to the court before the 20 day limit expires, March 2nd.

"We are of the opinion," said Mr. Slater this morning in discussing the case, "that the court in deciding in the case had failed to apply at least two well known maxims of construction. The first of these is that the statutes can not be declared unconstitutional unless it is clearly and manifestly so. The other is that where two constructions may be given the act, one of which will make it void and the other valid, that one must be adopted which makes it valid if it can be done within reason."

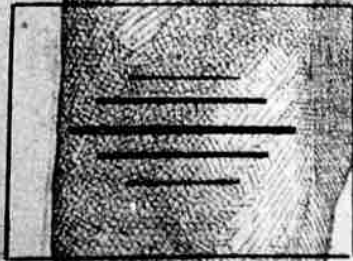

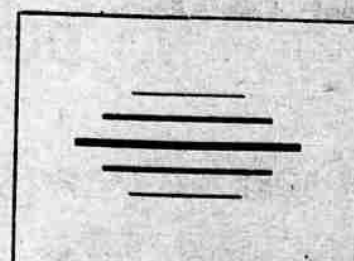
