ORCHARDMEN SEE LIGHT

LOCAL DELEGATE HOME FROM TACOMA.

Executive Council and Control Board Will Be Formed.

G. I. Dornberger is back from Tacoma where, as a delegate from this valley's apple growers, more especially Imbler's, he attended the meeting of orchardmen to work out a selling plan. An executive committee was formed and the district segregated, and the result will prove beneficial, it is believed by Mr. Dornberger. The proposed inauguration of a board of control and an executive council will stabilize the market, Mr. Dornberger says.

W. H. Paulhamus, of Puyallup, is chairman of the executive committee, the others being C. T. Haskell, of Wenatchee, and Truman Butler, of Hood River.

While the office of the executive committee will be maintained at Puyallup, the members of the Board of Control will hold meetings at different fruit centers.

Auctions to Be Eliminated. It is planned to eliminate consignment and auction sales, and to arrange for the collection through the shippers of a tax to be paid by the growers, not to exceed 1-4 cent a box on apples and pears, 1-4 cent a package on strawberries and 1-6 cent a package on all other small fruits per carload of fruit shipped, to provide for the expense of the organization.

The fruitgrowing sections of the four Northwestern states are divided into the following districts:

Wenatchee District—Chelan, Okanogan, Douglas and Grant counties, Washington.

Yakima District—Yakima, Kittitas, Benton and Franklin counties.

Western Oregon—All counties of Oregon west of the Cascade Mountains north of Josephine county.

Hood River District—Hood River and Wasco counties, in Oregon, and Klickitat and Skamania counties, Washington.

Malheur in Idaho District—Southern Idaho—Southern Idaho and Malheur counties, Oregon.

Lewiston—Clarkston District—Asotin and Garfield counties, Snake river points in Whitman county, Nez Perce, Idaho, and Lewis, portions of Latah county.

Spokane District—Remaining territory in Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho.

Montana District—Comprising the state of Montana.

Walla Walla District—Walla Walla and Columbia counties, Washington, and Umatilla, Union, Baker and Walla Walla counties, Oregon.

Rogue River District—Josephine and Jackson counties, Oregon.

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COVE WINNER AT WALLOWA

BEATEN BY JOSEPH BUT WINNER AT WALLOWA

Championship Title Glimmers and Percentage Need Seen.

Basketball championship for Eastern Oregon is just as clear as mud, and once more the crying need of a system of percentage for Eastern Oregon schools is heard. Cove, beaten by Union and Union herself often beaten, fell before Joseph Friday night, and then turned around and beat Wallowa—looked upon as a surely undefeatable team this year—throwing the championship to nowhere.

A simple percentage table for the whole section of the state, if adopted would without a shadow of doubt clarify what will, under conditions prevailing now, mean frequent murky and impossible analysis of basketball supremacy.

Wallowa Discontented.

Wallowa, Feb. 22.—(Special.) Wallowa lost their first game of the season, Saturday night, to the Cove high school. The score was 21 to 22. The game was close all the way through and at no time was either team ahead over three points, except at the end of the first half, when Cove led, 11 to 6. Over confidence was one cause of

Wallowa's defeat, and another was poor umpiring, done by the Cove coach. He repeatedly called fouls on Wallowa, when it seemed they should have been called on Cove. When Wallowa got a good shot at a basket, the Cove coach would blow his whistle, and say a foul had been committed by a Wallowa man—a few seconds before. Had the Umpire called the fouls correctly Wallowa would no doubt have won.

Even now Wallowa has as good a chance to claim the championship, as any other team in Eastern Oregon, as they have only been defeated once, while Cove has been defeated several times, and there is no high school in Eastern Oregon which has not been defeated.

M. I. A. Have Little Trouble Taking Contest from Pendleton.

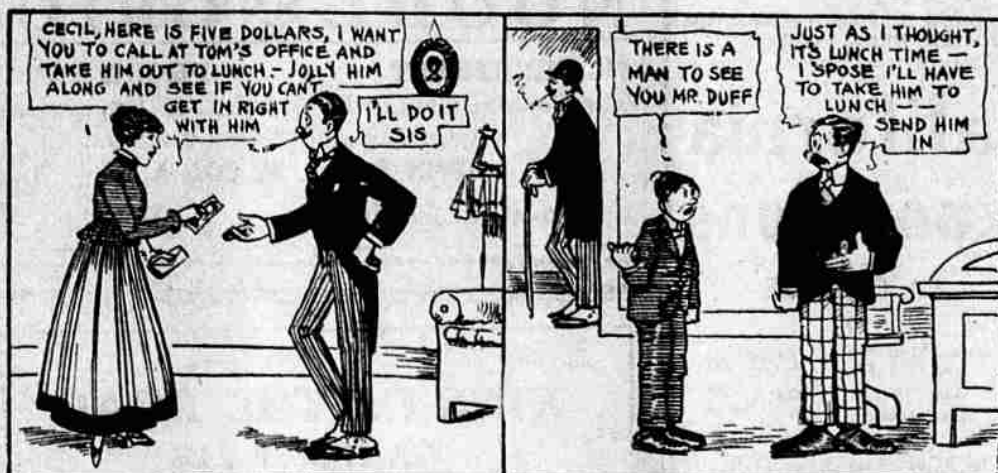
