a brief description of the notable scenic attractions in every community in the state. In addition to the description, state how the scenery may best be reached, whether by train, trolley or automobile and its approximate distance from principal points.

The following is from the Portland Journal:

Larch Mountain
"When the creator made the wonderful gorge of the Columbia, with its awe inspiring scenery, he said, according to Samuel C. Lancaster, engineer of the Columbia highway, "Some day the men whom I have created will want a grandstand from which this whole glorious panorama may be seen." And so he built Larch mountain.

"Like all His work it was a perfect job. There was no skimping of ma-

terial, no dodging of specifications, no favoritism to contractors.

"The mountain rises into the sky a distance of 4000 feet and from its summit can be seen a mighty expanse of sierra, river and plain.

"There are verdant forests, towering crags, leaping waterfalls, foaming cascades, green meadows, flowering orchards and habitations of men, all contributing to the glory and the beauty of Oregon. Standing guard over all are eight snow covered peaks silhouetted against the sky.

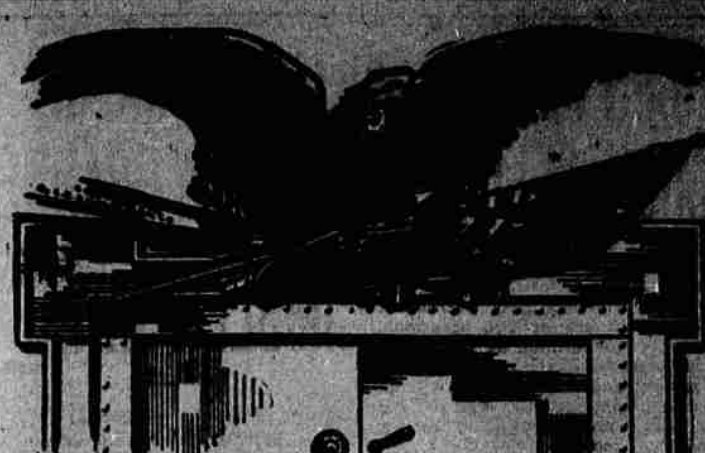
"It is one of the most imposing views in the world and what is best of all it can be made accessible to every one by a small expenditure in the construction of a trail from the foot of Multnomah falls to the summit of the mountain, a distance of five miles as the trail would wind. The trail in itself would be a great scenic asset.

"In southern California they talk about Mount Lowe and Mount Wilson, but as Roadmaster Yeon says: "There would be nothing to it after people once looked from the summit of Larch mountain."

"After Engineer Lancaster succeeds in enlisting money and men in the construction of the Larch mountain trail it should be made the base of a system that will take in other scenic points on the heights above the river, of which there are many surpassing those of Switzerland.

"The time is not far distant when this region will be a great playground both summer and winter not only for the people of Portland but for the world."

I am satisfied that a view fully as fine may be had from the summit of Mt. Emily on the right kind of a day. There is already a trail to the top of this mountain from the end of a fairly good road. The road leads to within two miles of the summit and will very likely be built the rest of the way this year. The worst and steepest part of this road is encountered within two miles of town, on Fox hill. A road to the top of Mt. Emily would therefore cost but a small fraction of a road to the top of Larch mountain. A few hundred dollars judiciously expended on the present road and trail would permit vehicles (including automobiles) to go to the top of Mt. Emily with little or no trouble. That such a road would prove a great attraction to the best class of tourists, to local automobile owners and all lovers of nature, can not well be denied. I doubt that there

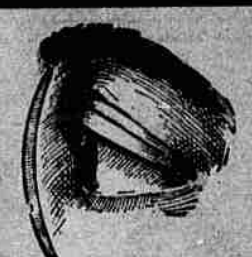
