NEW 640-ACRE BILL IS DOOMED

WILL NOT LIKELY GET THROUGH SENATE NOW

Eastern Oregon Has Shown Keen Interest in the Welfare of Measure.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 20.—(Special Observer Correspondence)—There is almost no chance for the passage of the 640 acre stock-raising homestead bill through the Senate this session according to Senator H. L. Myers, chairman of the Public Lands Committee of the Senate. Senator Myers is heartily in favor of the bill and his committee has reported favorably on the Ferguson bill which passed the House of Representatives January 18 but owing to the chaotic condition of the Senate calendar and account of the filibuster and the determination of the administration to shove everything aside for the ship purchase bill it is doubtful whether the 640-acre homestead bill can be reached at all.

The members of the Oregon delegation have received numerous letters from settlers in Eastern Oregon pleading for the enactment of this legislation allows any qualified homesteader to file on 640 acres of unappropriated unreserved public land which shall have been designated by the secretary of the Interior as "stock raising land." Proof to be made at end of three years residence and settler must make permanent improvements which will increase the value of the land at least \$1.25 an acre, for stock raising purposes, within such three years. If the bill is not passed by the Senate before March 4 it will die on that date with the 63rd Congress and before it can become a law would have to pass the House again as well as the Senate.

Our fellows have been in the habit of shouting across to the enemy, and we used to get answers from them. We were told to get into conversation with them and this was what happened:

From our trenches—Good morning Fritz. (No answer) Good morning, Fritz. (Still no answer) Good morning, Fritz.

From the German trenches—Good morning.

From our trenches—How are you?

"All right."

"Come over here Fritz."

"No; if I come I get shot."

"No, you want to come on."

"No fear."

"Come and get some fags, Fritz."

"No, you come half way and I meet you."

"All right."

One of our fellows thereupon filled his pocket with fags and got over the trench. The German got over his trench; and, right enough, they met half way and shook hands, Fritz taking the fags and giving chocolate in exchange.

It was good to see the Germans standing on top of their trenches, and the English also, with caps waving in the air, all cheering. About 18 of our men went half way and met about the same number of Germans.

This lasted about a half an hour, when each side returned to their trenches to shoot at each other again.

What I have written is the truth, but don't think we have chums, as two of our fellows were killed the same night, and I don't know how many of them.
