COMMISSION FILLS ORDERS

EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES PROVIDED

Extension of Two Blocks of Sewer Recommended to Solve Problem

Equipment needed for the water department and fire department of the city were ordered purchased at the meeting of the city commission last evening. I've hundred feet of two and a half inch hose, acids and such articles as are needed for the fire truck, constitute the fire department budget and the water department is to have the supply of brass goods needed, amounting in all to \$244.00. The hose is to cost not to exceed \$1.10 a foot.

The commission also heard recommendations for rearranging the sewer at M and N between First and Oak. At that point all districts come together and by building a block extension on each of the two streets the solution will be solved, giving ample sewer facilities to all concerned.

Several Bonding Ordinances Passed. Representatives of the Elks lodge appeared before the commission asking for an adjustment of water rates for the natatorium in the new building.

General Manager's report for the week ending Feb. 20th, 1915.

One fire alarm for chimney fire on the 18th. No damage. In sending in the alarm the neighbor wanted to know if there was not a reward of \$5.00 for sending in a fire alarm. There never was any such practice here or anywhere else so far as known. Another chimney fire on the 19th at the Grande Ronde Valley House. People with chimney fires might do as our grandmothers did in such cases and save the volunteer expense of about \$15.00. Our grandmothers threw a handful of common table salt in the stove on a burning fire. The fumes make the best dampener on a chimney fire.

The police arrested 12 besides one state arrest, drunks 1, disorderly three, assault one, vagrants 5, traffic violations one, served 21 meals, 19 sleepers, and five lights out. Fines \$75.00. The chief has installed his own typewriter and office chair and uses two pair of his own handcuffs. It might be added that the treasurer is also using his own typewriter.

The street superintendent spent \$78.75 in labor on the streets. This included \$12.00 prison labor. Including \$19.00 prison work, \$50.10 was spent on the building. Also spent \$9.90 for gravel for building and obtained a car of cement for \$322.50 of which two-thirds is to be used in the building and the rest on the drain on First street under the walk.

The water superintendent spent \$49.00 on repairs and \$11.00 reading meters and \$5.50 on a tap.

The Recorder received \$75.00 from fines, \$21.75 rent for septic tank land, \$23.02 on Sewer two, Sec. three, with 48 cents interest thereon, \$1.00 for two building permits, and \$4.00 for four dog licenses. He drew a contingent warrant for \$322.50 for cement, \$106.80 for labor certificates, \$6.00 witness fees, \$43.00 for printing, \$1.10 for nails and warrants for \$1,033.19 for bills O. K. by manager and read at a previous meeting.

The treasurer collected \$321.15 water rent, \$1327.18 taxes from county treasurer, \$1.00 for two electrical permits, \$324.49 Imp. Dist. Installments, \$175.45 interest on same. He paid \$64.95 water warrants, \$2.00 Park warrants, \$343.50 contingent warrant, and \$28.50 road warrant for the sinking fund.
