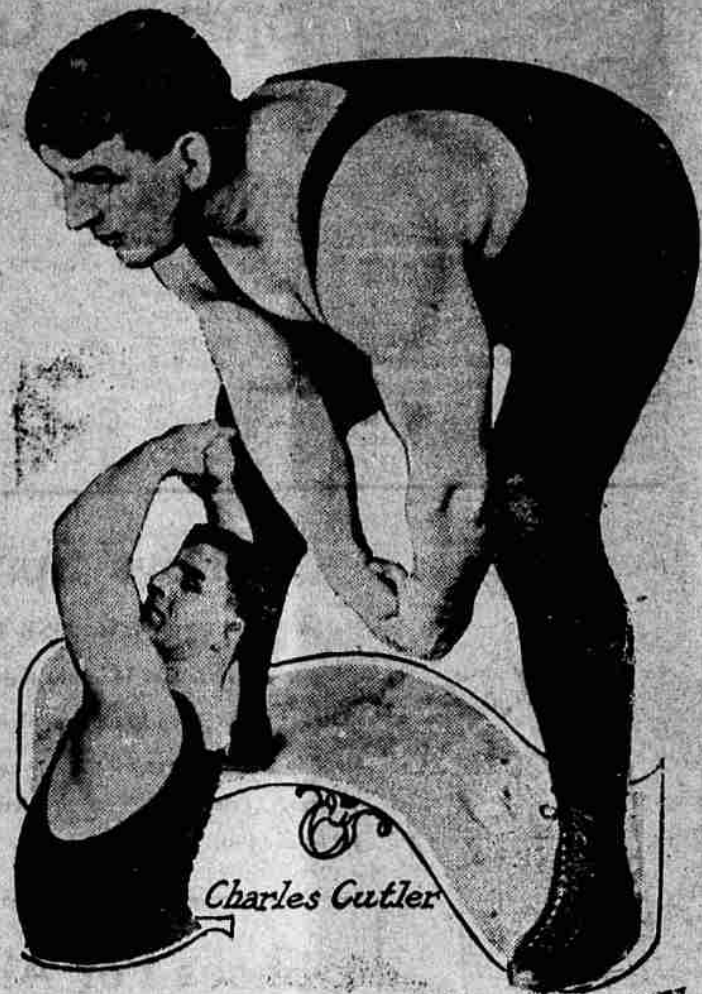

LEAGUE OF NEUTRALS.

Precedent Found for Active and United Action if Desired
Indianapolis News: Late last December the government of Venezuela proposed that the governing board of the Panama American Union call a conference of neutral nations.

Something must shortly be done if

that part of the world which is at peace—and wishes to remain so—is to be protected from possible attack by belligerents.

Venezuela's suggestion has caused an investigation to be made for precedents. A significant one is to be found during the reign of Catherine the Great. During the war of the American revolution several European powers became involved. The hereditary hostility between France and England prompted the former to assist the rebellious colonists, later, through the influence of France, Spain added her weight to the opposition which England met in home waters. Naval operations from 1776 to 1780 took place on many seas and neutral shipping snuffed. The combatants were not sympathetic toward the rights of neutrals and as a result Catherine the Great of Russia devised what history has called the "armed league of neutrality." In 1780 Denmark and Sweden endorsed the Russian idea. Prussia and Austria came over in 1782 and Portugal a year later. France and Spain recognized the fundamental principle. The league had for its main object the practical enforcement of the principle that the vessels of a neutral power might carry without molestation goods belonging to the subject of a belligerent.

In 1909 a conference of diplomats from practically every nation was held in London. A few code covering

conduct during war was adopted, known as the declaration of London. But this declaration was not ratified, and now, by various expressions from Germany and Great Britain, becomes practically null and void. The neutral powers thus find themselves somewhat in the same position occupied by the Baltic and later by others in Europe during the revolutionary war. The league of Catherine had for its argument no more diplomatic persuasion. It was exactly what it professed to be—an armed coalition. Holland was attracted to it through the burdens imposed on her shipping and this led to actual war between Holland and Great Britain. The demands of the league, practically enough, covered points which are in dispute at the present time. Then as now, the rights of neutral shipping hinged on the definition of contraband.
