Eggs took another slump yester-
day indicating a very uncertain founda-
tion for that commodity. The mar-
ket up and down the coast is bearish
with a great supply coming in.
Furthermore, eggs at that price are
fresh without exception.

There was a general shifting of the
market this morning. Top grades of
lemons bring 35 cents today, and
sweet potatoes have gone up to seven
cents a pound. Cranberries are 20
cents a quart.
